**EX-KAISER INTERESTED  
IN PORTION OF TREATY;  
KEEPS ON SAWING WOOD**

AMERONGEN, Wednesday, May 29.—(by the Associated Press)—Since the former German emperor has been acquainted with the peace terms he has become even more invisible to the outside world. The only possibility of catching a glimpse of his former majesty is when he crosses a draw bridge twice daily, going to and returning from his log-sawing in the garden of the castle, and there he is only within sight for about four seconds.

**AUSTRIAN TREATY  
IS NOT READY YET;  
SESSION POSTPONED**

Balkan States Powers Want  
More Time To Consider  
Terms.

PARIS, May 29.—When the peace conference met in plenary session this afternoon to hear the Austrian peace terms, it was announced that the treaty had not yet been completed. It was decided, therefore, to postpone the session until Saturday, when the completed treaty was expected to be ready.

Another reason for postponement of the plenary session was a request from the smaller powers, especially the Balkan States, that they be allowed further time to consider the terms.

**AIRPLANES WILL CONNECT  
NEWFOUNDLAND WITH  
THE MAINLAND SOON**

ST. JOHNS, Nfld., May 29.—Newfoundland, which has suddenly found itself the center of world aviation, soon may be connected with Canada and the United States by aerial mail, and passenger lines. It developed today when the lower house of the colonial legislature ratified concessions granted the Imperial Aircraft Manufacturing Company of London.

According to a representative of the company, who recently arrived here, service will first be introduced between St. John's and Montreal. He said the distance would be covered in sixteen hours.

**REDUCE RHINE  
ARMIES WHEN  
ENEMY SIGNS**

May Be Cut To Six Divisions,  
Says Churchill.

**RUSSIAN OUTLOOK BRIGHT**

Allied Troops May All Be  
Withdrawn From Muscovite  
Territory This Summer.

LONDON, May 29.—Winston Spencer Churchill, secretary of state for war, speaking in the House of Commons today, foreboded the possibility of the withdrawal of foreign troops from Russia by the end of the summer, owing to the favorable situation.

As soon as peace was signed, he said, the Rhine army could be reduced from ten to six divisions, and still more when it was realized that peace was being effectively carried out.

No Break Among Allies. Asked by Sir Frederick Hall, in the House of Commons today, whether his attention had been called to Congressman Julius Kahn's report of dissensions between the American army authorities in Europe and the allied military staff, Andrew Bonar Law replied in the affirmative.

"I am glad to say," he added, "that the relations between the American and the British authorities always have been most cordial."

SWISS ARE CAUTIOUS. GENEVA, May 29.—(by the Associated Press)—The Swiss Government has decided to react negatively to the allied note concerning the blockade of Germany if Germany refuses to sign the peace terms. It is held that compliance would infringe on Swiss neutrality.

AUSTRIA AGREEABLE TO DELAY. ST. GERMAIN, May 29.—Dr. Karl Renner, head of the Austrian delegation, has been notified that the peace treaty will be communicated on Monday. Dr. Renner offered no objection to this.

**LICENSE OFFICIALS  
ALMOST SPOTLESS IN  
EYES OF MEREDITH**

Quite Proper to Send Liquor  
to Homer.

**CHIEF ONLY INDISCREET**

Commissioner's Only Con-  
demnation Is Levelled at  
World Reporter.

(By Canadian Press.) TORONTO, May 29.—Charges preferred by H. Hartley Dewar, M.P.P., and others against the administration of the Ontario License Commission, and in particular against Chief Inspector J. A. Ayeart, are declared to be without foundation by Sir William Meredith, who some time ago completed his investigation into the charges and who today submitted his report to Hon. I. B. Lucas, attorney-general. His findings are:

1. There is no foundation for charges against members of the license commission, Inspector Ayeart or any officials of the department.

2. No foundation for charges with regard to the prosecution and conviction of Lorne W. Smith and H. Lavigne.

3. No foundation for charges with reference to the Slavin case.

4. Liquor was sent to Homer for no improper purpose, but to aid well-conceived plans to enforce the law.

5. Morrison was a capable officer, but his failure to inform the commission of his connection with the detective agency was improper.

6. Charges made by Employers' Detective Agency were reasonable.

7. It is necessary to maintain a large staff of men for detective work if liquor laws are to be properly enforced.

8. Mr. Ayeart had no share in earnings of Employers' Detective Agency men, but he was guilty of a grave indiscretion in borrowing from Solomon.

9. The World charges are without foundation and give an untrue, unfair and misleading account of what Reporter Cronin saw. His inferences were unfair, biased, unjust and in some cases grotesquely absurd.

At present the keenest competition for first to "hop off" seems to be between the Handley-Pare and Vimy-Vickers teams. Captain Jack Alcock, pilot of the Vimy, has installed the two engines, which will drive his machine.
