NOTICE TO HAMILTON SUBSCRIBERS
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ASK RATEPAYERS FOR \$55,000 FOR NEW PARKS

Bylaw Will Be Submitted in January—Next Year's Changes in Civic Administration.

HAMILTON, Sept. 15.—(Special.)—The parks board this evening decided to ask the council to submit a bylaw next January asking the ratepayers to vote \$55,000 for new parks as follows: Beach, \$20,000; North End Park, \$10,000; Holland A. White property on the mountain side, \$9,000; Beckett property, \$8,000. The question of removing the Gore Park fence and installing fancy lamps was left over until the next meeting.

Wm. Huggins, Stony Creek, was arrested this afternoon on a charge of stealing a watch from Frank Trainer, James McKeand, collector for the Great Hamilton Association, was brought to the hospital from Dundas this evening with a broken leg. He had been recently discharged from the hospital after being treated for a broken leg, and to-day he broke the limb again.

The committee appointed to map out a scheme of roadway and street railway improvements for next year had its first session this afternoon and will have another meeting Thursday morning at 11 o'clock. It is expected that the street railway will continue the reconstruction work on York, West King and North James-streets and the city will lay permanent pavements on these streets and on Cannon-street. A bylaw for \$200,000 will be submitted to the ratepayers next January to raise the funds.

Division Court Cases.
Wally Barron, the big wing man of the Tigers, failed in the division court this morning to collect \$55, which he claimed he had loaned to Douglas M. Thompson, at the time of Thompson's marriage. Wally denied that the debt was part of a split bet, but admitted that he and Thompson sent out letters to their friends, asking them to put up \$2 each on a "sure thing," they claimed to have on a horse race. Thompson denied that he owed Wally the \$50, and the case was dismissed. Convictions against John Seaman and Henry Smerens for selling ice cream on Sunday were quashed.

The Buffalo Symphony Orchestra has invited the Elgar Choir to sing in Buffalo next February. The choir will probably accept the invitation, and may also give a concert in Toronto.

Objected to Lawyer's Bills.
Some of the Barton Township councillors objected at a star chamber session last night to the bills of Solicitor Duff, who billed them for \$1268 for the Barton-Hamilton water suit and \$279 for the annexation case. Mr. Duff threw off \$175, and the bills were settled, although it is said that two of the councillors attended the session armed with a resolution asking for his resignation as township solicitor.

Miss Margaret Briggs, a maid at the city hospital, died this morning from typhoid fever from which several of the nurses are also suffering.

Can Sell Rifle to Minor.
Inspector Kerr this morning brought a charge in police court against George Beattie for selling a rifle to a minor. George Daw, J. L. Counsell argued that the law prohibited the sale of an air gun or pistol to a minor, but said nothing about rifles. The magistrate agreed with him, dismissing the case. The lawyer tried to get the gun away from the inspector, who hung onto it gamely, declaring that he wanted it for evidence in a charge of violating the game laws that he would lay against Daw. The magistrate granted a stated case in the charge made against Buldaci Arrnu, for selling liquor without a license. The defence was that the liquor belonged to the boarders. John Borza was fined \$50 for selling liquor without a license. Mrs. Mabel Buckingham was sent down for three months.

Changes in Civic Government.
Next year it is proposed to abolish the finance, sewers and fire and water committees. The board of control will take the place of the finance committee, and the construction departments of the board of works, sewers and waterworks will be placed under the control of the board of works.

The fire department will be put under the markets committee. The ratepayers will be asked for about \$50,000 for sewers, \$200,000 for roads, \$200,000 for sewers, and \$25,000 for retaining the present library building.
