

CHOICE CATTLE SCARCE WITH VALUES FIRMER

Active Demand for Stockers and Feeders at Market Yesterday.

TRADE WAS STEADY

Prices in Sheep, Lambs and Hogs Remained Unchanged—Veal Higher.

Receipts of live stock at the Union Stock Yards on Tuesday were 57 cars, comprising 702 calves or hogs, 78 sheep, 200 calves and 4 horses.

Butchers' cattle—When the stockers, feeders, milkers and springers were deducted from the number of cattle reported on sale, there would be no surplus of the fresh arrivals that were offered and sold as fat. Amongst the number of choice was comparatively small, all of which were bought at firm values, quality considered. Common and medium grades were sold at lower prices, the best of which were not more than three or four cents above the market. The best head of cattle were sold at \$8.50 to \$9.00, while cash was \$8.00 to \$8.50. A large number of butchers' cattle sold between \$7.00 and \$7.50. There was a good demand, all from different parts of Ontario, for stockers with the tendency to higher values for fat cattle. Steers, 4 to 6 years, 1000 lbs., \$7.50 to \$8.00; 4 to 5 years, 1000 lbs., \$7.00 to \$7.50; 3 to 4 years, 1000 lbs., \$6.50 to \$7.00. Hogs and springers—There was a steady trade for these. The best two-year-old springers were sold at \$10.00 to \$11.00, while cash was \$9.00 to \$10.00. Prices ranged from \$9.00 to \$10.00.

Veal calves—More of them were offered, all of suitable quality sold at steady values, in 25 cents per cwt. higher. We only heard of one calf selling for \$10 per cwt. Spring hogs, \$8.00 to \$8.50; 4 to 6 years, 1000 lbs., \$7.50 to \$8.00; 3 to 4 years, 1000 lbs., \$7.00 to \$7.50; 2 to 3 years, 1000 lbs., \$6.50 to \$7.00.

Butchers' cattle—Choice heavy steers at \$8.25 to \$8.50; good butchers' cattle at \$7.50 to \$8.00; medium butchers' cattle at \$7.00 to \$7.50; common butchers' cattle at \$6.50 to \$7.00; 4 to 6 years, 1000 lbs., \$7.50 to \$8.00; 3 to 4 years, 1000 lbs., \$7.00 to \$7.50; 2 to 3 years, 1000 lbs., \$6.50 to \$7.00.
