AID CANADIAN PRISONERS

Toronto Women to Raise Fund and Will Forward It to

A representative gathering of women of various societies met in the parliament buildings yesterday afternoon, when Lady Hendrie called the meeting to order and explained its object. A small preliminary meeting had been held last week, and from it she had been requested to call the meeting of yesterday. Col. Fraser explained in detall that the object was to interest the women of Ontario in the presentation to her royal highness the Duchess of Connaught of a fund which would serve the purpose of a farewell gift and at the same time go to benefit Canadian soldiers.

When first approached on the subject her royal highness had declined to allow any collection on account of war conditions, but when it was explained that this would be a disappointment and would make her case an exception to that of her predecessors, she consented on condition that the fund collected should go not in a personal gift to herself, but to increase her fund for prisoners in Germany.

Col. Fraser stated that in response

many. Col. Fraser stated that in response to an enquiry a message had been received from Lord Richard Neville that the fund when subscribed would go to Canadian soldiers only. If war conditions should make it so that the fund was not all exhausted, the remaining portion would for the control of the con was not all exhausted, the remaining portion would go to any patriotic cause chosen by her royal highness. The name of Clarence Bogart, Esq., of the Dominion Bank, was proposed as nonorary treasurer of the fund, and accepted by the meeting.

Every woman in the province is asked to contribute; and a letter, a draft of which was read, will go out to the heads of societies explaining the proposal and asking tehir co-operation. PREPARE FOR RISE IN PRICE OF MILK

Amount of Increase Not Stated, But Takes Effect October First.

LABOR SCARCITY

Best Producers Gone Overseas and Substitute Help is Not Efficient.

Something for which Toronto may prepare is a decided rise in the price of milk. The exact amount of the inor milk. The exact amount of the increase is not yet decided upon.

The dictum of a rise comes from the producers. The Oxford Milk Producers' Association, according to yesterday's reports, is now asking an increase of 60 cents per hundredweight for milk and an increase of 5 cents per pound butterfat for cream. The reasons given for the demand are that

labor is scarce and the cost of food high. The dairy concerned has agreed to the increase in price.

Inquiry by The World elicited the information that the main reason for the ingrease in price is that the main reason for the increase in rate is that most of the milk is now used for cheese manufacture. Cheese is exported and used as one of the most extensive war rations. While it formerly sold for 12 or 13 cents wholesale, it now brings 22 cents. For the last three months the city distributor, according to our informant, has been paying an ininformant, has been paying an increase to the producer, but without raising the price to the consumer, and
