#### FINN OF CHICAGO

Ever at the Service of Canadians Who Need Him.

Ottawa, Sept. 9.-There has been a complaint in Canada that British consuls do not urge our interests suffi-ciently abroad. The trade and commerce department recently sent a copy of the Canadian industrial blue book containing a list of Canadian exporters to all British consuls in the United States, and in European countries as well. A number of acknowledgments have been received, all stating the book would prove of the greatest use. Alexander Finn, head of the important consulate at Chicago, writes: "I take this opportunity of pointing out to you that this consulate is always ready to do anything that is in its power to assist the commerce of any portion of the British empire, but that few Canadians ask us for information, while we are flooded with enquiries from exporters of the United States. As you are superintendent of Canadian commercial agencies, I would suggest that you should regard this consulate as one of your agencies, and make all possible use of my staff and their knowledge of the trade and capabilities of this consular district, and I recommend that Canadian merchants and manufacturers and others call upon us when visiting Chicago."
