## GIANTS AND YANKS IN FINE FORM

Have Braced Themselves in  
Top Positions

Ruth and Meusel Add Punch  
to Yankees' Game—White  
Sox Pitcher Wins His Own  
Game in 18th Inning—Heil-  
man's Tenth Homer.

New York, June 12.—After balancing precariously at the top of their respective leagues for several weeks as a result of erratic playing, the New York Giants and Yankees have braced and apparently regained championship form for the mid-season drive.

Playing better ball than any of their rivals during the past week, the Yankees by winning again yesterday from St. Louis, increased their lead to four and a half games, while the Giants, again trimming the Reds, held a two game advantage over the Pirates, who were idle. Resembling more closely last year's wrecking crew than at any time this season, the Yankees have got away to a flying start in their first western invasion. Ruth and Meusel have caught their batting strides and are adding to the team's attack the punch that has been lacking so far. Already supplied with stellar pitching, Hughes' crew apparently is ready to set a dizzy pace for the St. Louis Browns, the only team regarded as capable of giving the New Yorkers a real brush for the pennant. The Yankees yesterday batted Shocker, their erstwhile jinx, from the box for the second day in succession. Hoyt held the Browns after a shaky start.

The St. Louis outfit, with the exception of Geo. Sider and possibly one or two others, has experienced a temporary batting slump and, with some erratic hurling, has fallen back in the race. The McGraw men took a 2 to 1 decision from the Reds, although League allowed only three bingles, two of them scratches, while the Reds rapped Ryan for ten hits.

Dutch Ruether had an easy time hanging up his 11th victory of the season, and Brooklyn made it two straight from the Cubs.

Leverette, White Sox pitcher, won his own game in a 12 inning struggle with Boston, his double driving across the deciding tally, while the Indians rallied in the ninth to beat the Athletics in a slugfest match.

Fellette held Washington to two lonely hits, while the Tigers pounded Morgan and Gleason for 17 safe blows, including Heilmann's tenth homer of the season, and eight runs.

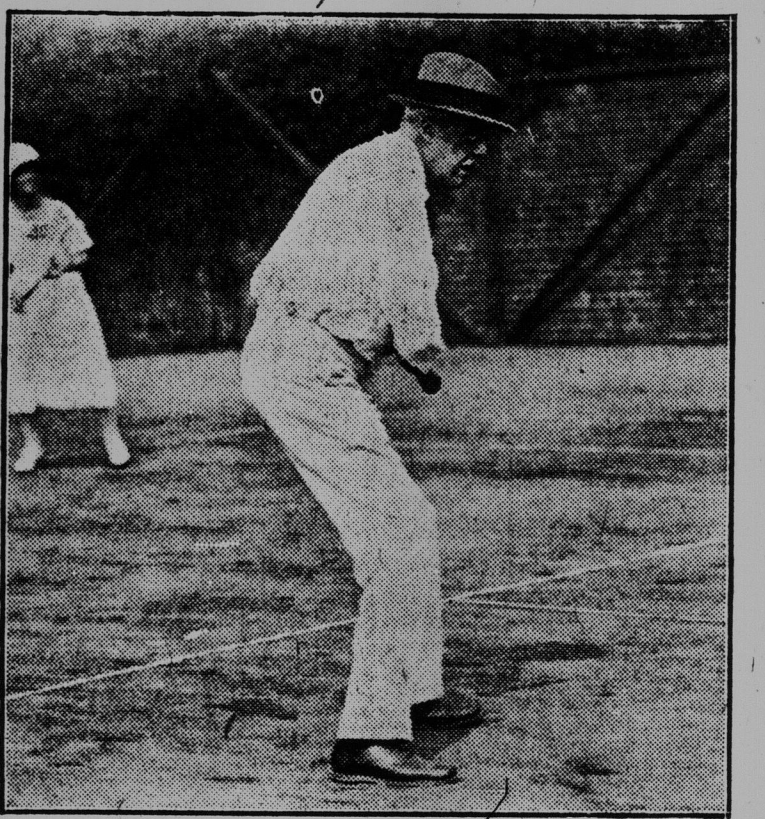

## TO EXAMINE MRS. CHAPLIN.

Labor Department Acts to Find if She is Able to Return to England.

Washington, June 12.—Federal health officials at San Francisco have been asked to examine Mrs. Hannah Chaplin, mother of Charlie Chaplin, comedian, to determine if her mental and physical condition is such as to permit her to return to her home in England.

This action was taken by Assistant Secretary of Labor Henning, following the filing by attorneys for Mr. Chaplin of a statement that his mother's condition had improved greatly since her admission a year ago by the immigration authorities into the United States for treatment, but that an order directing her departure from the country at this time would cause a relapse.
