TOO LONG TIME FROM ELECTION

WEEK-END SHOW

St. Lonis, Aug. 27-The long period between the election of the President of the United States and his inauguration is "a serious evil fraught with much danger," according to the report of a special committe on the change in date of the presidential inauguration, presented today to the convention of the American Bar Association, in session The reports recommends that the per-

iod be shortened, and that the short term of the old Congress be eliminated. It, however, does not suggest any other date however, does not suggest any other date for the inauguration, explaining that March 4, has been recognized by constitutional amendment as the date of inaugural. It adds:

"The committee, however, is of the opinion that it is the duty of this association representing the great body of lawyers of the country to call attention of Congress to those provisions of the law and of the Constitution which are fraught with serious danger and which

law and of the Constitution which are fraught with serious danger and which are liable to bring humiliation and disaster to the republic."

It states that the period between election and inauguration is "liable to leave the administration in hands which have been discredited by a popular vote of want of confidence and that such a situation greatly weakens the prestige of the government both at home and abroad.

A NEW BENEFACTOR FOR MIKE GILHOOLEY

New York, Aug. 27-"Mike" Gilhoo-New York, Aug. 27—"Mike" Gilhooley, persistent stowaway, who was adopted by Mrs. Marion G. Curry, a writer, when the Ellis Island authorities were about to ship "Mike" Europeward for the fifth time, is to have a new benefactor in a "prominent New York banker," it was announced by Mrs. Curry's attorney, David C. Gordon. Although Mr. Gordon did not disclose the banker's identity, he said "Mike" was with him at his summer home.

Mrs. Curry has filed a voluntary petition in bankruptcy, disclosing liabilities of \$111,310 and assets of \$700.
