

TRICKERY USED TO GET REINFORCEMENTS TO BOLSHEVIK FRONT

London, March 22- (Correspondence of the Associated Press)—An instance of he deception the Bolshevik government is forced to practice in order to secure reinforcements for its army is contain-ed in information just received in Lon-

ed in information just received in London.

A proclamation was issued at Petrograd ordering a trial mobilization of the "First Town Section" for two days to test its state of preparedness. It was stated that the men of the reserve would be permitted to return to their work after two days. When the reservists assembled they were told that as Petrograd was unsuitable for manocuvre purposes they would be taken a short distance out of town. Unsuspectingly the men climbed into box cars, whose doors were then locked, and the men were sent as reinforcements to the western front. There they remain, although the Bolshevik officers naively complain that these reinforcements have not been of much fighting value.

Desertions from the Bolshevik ranks and disobedience of orders are reported on the increase in North Russia, also a lack of training among officers and men and deficiency of arms and material. In the Ural district riots are reported to have occurred owing to the difference of pay between troops at the front and those remaining behind the lines.

Anti-Bolshevik sentiment is said to be so pronounced among some of the regiments garrisoning Petrograd that the authorities are afraid to take action against disaffected units or to send them to the front.

Moreover, it cannot safely be assured that in all future wars the flanks of the opposing forces will rest on neutral states or impassable obstacles."

The field marshal devotes a special section to: "Why we attacked whenever possible," in which he says:

"The object of all war is victory and a purely defensive attitude can never bring about a successful decision."

The emphasized that the defensive role sooner or later produced a lowering of morale, while the defender became almost entirely ignorant of his opponents dispositions and plans. This was exemplified in the fighting of 1918. "So long as the enemy attacked, he obtained a fairly full information regarding our dispositions," says Sir Douglas, "but so soon as he was thrown on the defensive and the initiative returned to the Allies, he was kept in comparative ignorance of our plans and dispositions, and the Allies were able to effect many surprises, both strakegic and tactical."
