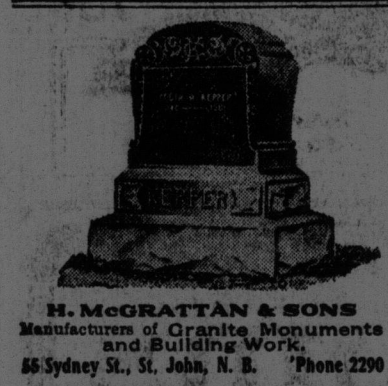

## HOG CHOLERA

Thanks to wise government regulations faithfully carried out Canadian swine raise a suffer comparatively little loss from hog cholera as compared with those of many other countries. From time to time, however, this disease appears in various parts of the Dominion where the infection has been brought in some way or other. This disease which is entirely confined to hogs is extremely contagious and accompanied by a high death rate. In order to put owners of swine on their guard the veterinary director general, Dr. F. Torrance, has issued a plain written bulletin setting forth such information as should enable the lay reader to readily detect the malady and understand what course to pursue in the case of an outbreak in his herd.

It is stated that the disease is caused by a germ which may be transferred in various forms in many different ways such as on the boots of attendants, the feeding of uncooked garbage containing raw pork which may have come from a diseased pig, wandering dogs, domestic pigeons, or in the water of a stream flowing through an infected pasture or yard.

Infected hogs lose appetite, become sluggish and, if moved, may cough. They rapidly become thin and weak, linger for a time or they may die in a few days. Other symptoms that will help diagnosis are described in the bulletin which contains a number of clear photo engravings of hogs in various stages of illness, as well as sections of internal organs showing characteristic diseased conditions.

Whenever the disease is noticed the owner is bound by law to notify a Veterinary Inspector. Failure to do this may be liable to a heavy fine besides the forfeiture of compensation for the loss of diseased animals.

On account of the nature of the subject treated this bulletin, No. 13 of the Health of Animals Branch, is not being sent out to names on the regular departmental mailing list. Persons who desire copies may receive them by making application to the Publications Branch of the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa.

PARTINGTON COMPANY'S LUMBER (Fredericton Mail).

Ex-Senator N. W. Jones and Thomas McAvoy of St. John, representing the E. Partington & Co. Lumber Company, were in the city on Friday and spent some time inspecting the company's property at Mayville. It has been decided to repair the dam which crosses the Nashua river, and the lumber which is carried away by the flood of the river, it is estimated that a portion of the lumber on the Nashua river will be manufactured at the Mayville mills, but how much of the total cut of 14,000,000 feet will be saved there is not yet known. As in 1912 a large quantity of the lumber will be sent to the pulp mill, it is expected that the lumber at the mouth of the Nashua will be going on steadily.

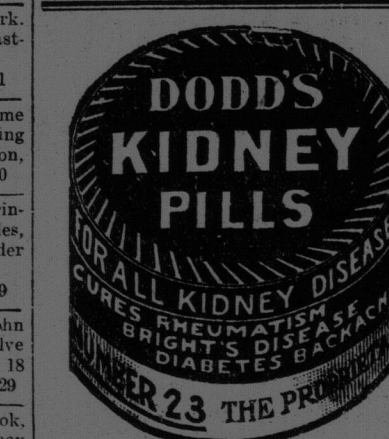
