The special cash prize donated by E. L. McDonald at the Amateur winter fair at the person scoring the highest points in the dairy cattle judging competition, was won by Daniel J. Barrett, of Hill Grove Farm, Crouville. Mr. McDonald, who is proprietor of the Halifax hotel, Halifax, has always taken a commendable degree of interest in dairy breeds. Mr. Barrett scored 93 points out of a possible 100. There were about sixty-eight competitors. The rest of the competing farmers or farmers' sons were from all parts of the maritime provinces. D. Drummond, of Ottawa, was judge of the dairy breeds.

**Called to Fairville Church**  
The congregation of the Fairville United Baptist church, at a meeting last night, decided to extend a unanimous call to Rev. H. R. Boyer to become their pastor. Mr. Boyer is a native of Fredericton and is a graduate of the U. N. B. At present he is taking his theological course in Newton Theological Seminary, Newton (Mass). His course will not be completed till June 1. He preached in the Fairville church the first Sunday in December, and made a fine impression. He held for some time the pastorate of the Gibson church, where he was very popular. Rev. Mr. Boyer is a fine scholar and effective organizer of congregational activities, and the Fairville congregation confidently expect that he will be able to do a notable work among them.

## PLEA FOR FARM FOR DRUNKARDS IS MADE

BY REV. A. A. GRAHAM

At the Every Day Club last evening Rev. A. A. Graham made a very strong argument in favor of the establishment of an industrial farm for drunkards who are sent to jail and the chain gang.

He stated that drunkenness is a disease. There are physical, mental and moral diseases. For bodily and mental diseases we provide hospitals, but the drunkard, we sent to jail. Mr. Graham drew a graphic picture of the work of the hospitals for bodily and mental diseases, and pleaded that science be applied in like manner for the cure of moral diseases. We do not now seek to punish but to reform men. The parole system has been found to work well, and the speaker believed the indeterminate sentence would be more generally adopted. There are very many cases where a short term would teach a man his lesson and give him back to good citizenship. Surely St. John should be able to do better than send drunkards to the chain gang. The speaker told of a man doing on the prison farm at Guelph, and expressed the conviction that a well conducted farm some forty or fifty acres in a sort of Abraham, Gray, would be the best solution of the problem with the apparently hopeless vice of drink.

Mr. Graham expressed pleasure at the night's audience, and urged them now to take a pledge against drink and unity with the Every Day Club in its work.

**DR. J. H. GRAY DEAD**  
Death came rather suddenly on Saturday night to Dr. James H. Gray, the well known physician, at his home in Fairville. Although confined to the house for three or four days with an attack of heart trouble, death was unexpected and came as a great shock to his family and his many friends. The deceased was in the usual good health the early part of the week, but on Tuesday night complaining of being ill. From then until the time of his death he was under the care of Doctors Addy and Emery. He appeared to be improving, but about 10 o'clock Saturday night took a weak turn from which he never rallied.

Dr. Gray was one of the best known physicians in St. John. He was in the sixty-eighth year of his age and practiced in the city for over twenty years. He was the president of the New Brunswick Medical Council, and his death will be a great loss to the medical fraternity both in this city and throughout the province.

Dr. Gray was born in Colima, Kings County, in 1842. For some years he practiced in Apolonia but later went to London (Eng.), where he studied in one of the large hospitals. In 1882 he moved to this city and has been practicing here ever since.

He was a prominent member of the I. O. F. in this city, being a charter member of Court Loyalist, of which he was the court physician for twenty-eight years. He was also deeply interested in educational work, and was secretary and trustee of the Fairville school board. Of a kindly disposition and of noble character, he was held in high esteem by all who knew him.

His wife and four children survive. Mrs. Gray, who before marriage was Miss Ellen Freeman, daughter of the late Martin Freeman, of Point de Bute (N. B.), is a prominent worker in the W. C. T. U. here. The daughters are Roberta, wife of W. L. Doherty of Hall & Fairweather's, and Misses Clara B. and Muriel L., at home. The son is Wendell T., who also resides at home. The funeral will take place tomorrow afternoon at 2:30 p. m. in the Methodist church, Fairville. It is likely that the members of the I. O. F. will attend in a body. Dr. Gray was prominently connected with the lodge of that order which probably also attended in a body.

**J. B. Giles, Head of Travelers**  
Montreal, Dec. 18.—J. B. Giles was, on Saturday evening, declared the victor in the contest against Charles T. Gurd for the presidency of the Dominion Commercial Travelers Association. His majority was only 185, the vote standing 1,084 for Giles to 1,269 for Gurd, the keen contest, bringing out an unusually heavy vote, which was taken by mail.

Reports showed the year to have been a record one, with total membership of 17,067, an increase of 377, while the revenue was \$90,720, an increase of \$9,974.
