My daughter has the circulating library habit," said a man to me the other day, and struck by the newness of the phrase, I looked my ears and waited eagerly for more.

He soon as a book is out," my friend went on with a man's patronizingly tolerant smile for the folks of the weaker sex, "my daughter makes frantic appeals to the librarians to 'save a copy for her.' It doesn't matter in the least who the author is, or what the theme may be, but she must have a copy as soon as possible.

"The name of the author, I find, is often forgotten as soon as the last page has been read, and very often she has confessed to me that she reads the new books only because everyone is talking about them, and it's so nice to be able to say she's read them."

Isn't it fortunate for the circulating libraries that there are heaps and heaps of people just like this man's daughter? I have a friend who is a reference librarian, and she says that every day many people come to her among for reviews of the new novels, which reviews they read merely that they may be able to talk about the books as if they had read them.

In the same way, I know people who seem to take pleasure in going to the theatre merely that when a play is mentioned they may say, "Yes, I've seen that."

Isn't this childish?

Just think, in one of these cases are the individuals doing the things they do for their own enjoyment or education, or merely because they want to be able to appear to others to have done them.

## CANADA GETS GREAT DEAL IN RETURN FOR BUT LITTLE

Trade Agreement Joyous News for St. John and  
Maritime Provinces — Detailed List of Articles  
Affected—No Canadian Interests Injured—Changes  
By Concurrent Legislation

The Times, in a second edition, which was in the hands of interested readers soon after 6:30 o'clock last evening, gave the main points in the tariff agreement made by Canada and the United States, and announced in the House of Commons at Ottawa last yesterday afternoon.

The agreement will take a conspicuous place in Canadian annals, as it will mark the letting down of a long barrier between Canada and the United States, and from the ratification of the agreement by congress and parliament renewed prosperity for all classes will date.

"So it will be seen that that which we failed to accomplish under the Chamberlain-Bayard treaty, that which was to be given free to the United States in return for free duty, we are accomplishing today exactly what they sought to accomplish in the Chamberlain-Bayard treaty, but which, unfortunately, was never accomplished because that treaty never went into operation."

"We present this agreement," said Hon. Mr. Fielding, "as one which we can sincerely commend to the judgment of the house and of the people. We do not present it as a victory over the United States, but as a small return for the good spirit in which they have acted."

"We present the arrangement not as a triumph of one country over another but as the result of an effort to do justice to both. The one fear I have is that there may be people who will say that there is a good thing in the United States and that they should not approve of it. In times past friendly arrangements with the United States have failed to receive the approval of congress, but we think that the time has come when we should have the psychological moment for dealing with the question. We think we are within reach of some of the commercial advantages of which we have struggled for half a century. We commit this matter to the parliament with the firm conviction that it is going to be a good thing for Canada and a good thing for the United States, and that it will promote the friendly relations and the commerce of the two countries."
