



A belt and sash of satin ribbon and point d'esprit lace is a dressy addition now fashionable for plain dark silks, or else for light muslins or other evening wide belt of plain blue The cardinal, or old gold satin is covered with point d'esprit [net, while the sash ends and loops are formed of three rows of satin ribbon, each two inches wide, with insertion of point d'esprit between each row, and plaiting of the lace across the ends.

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


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
