GREAT DAIRY INCREASE.

Cheese and Butter Sent From Canada to Britain Last Year.

Ottawa, Aug. 31.—Returns just published of Canada's foreign trade for the year ending June 30, 1906, show that exports of Canadian cheese to the British market totalled 214,577,077 lbs., of a value of \$24,300,968. This is almost the same quantity as found its way to the United Kingdom in 1905, but the better prices prevalent in 1906 showed an increase in the value of this trade of \$4,158,597.

Thirty-two million nine hundred and four thousand nine hundred and ninety pounds of Canadian butter, valued at \$8,492,902, found its way to Britain last year, which represents an increase of 2,514,521 lbs., and an increase in value of \$1,233,604.

Of Canadian bacon, 55,173,242 lbs., valued at \$11,567,619 were sold in England, which is a considerable decrease from the preceding year, when the trade was 116,705,197 lbs., worth \$12,180,817.

Canadian wheat exports to the motherland in 1906 were 26,957,892 bushels, as compared with 11,285,407 in the preceding year, which about equaled the trade of 1902.

Sales of Canadian eggs in England in 1906 totalled 2,683,000 dozen, valued at \$448,463, as compared with 2,382,483 dozen in 1905, of a value of \$360,610.

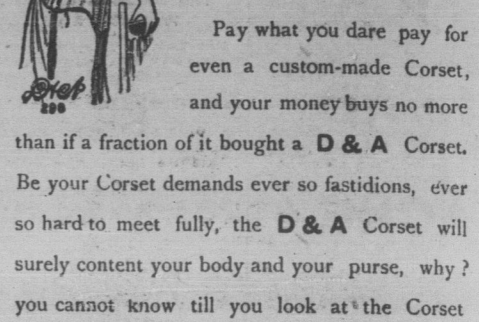
