Under the Provisions of the War Measures Act, 1914, His Excellency the Governor in Council has been pleased to order as follows:

1. The Colonial Secretary may, if he considers it expedient so to do, appoint a person to be Censor of the publications issued at any printing establishment or works, and any person so appointed shall have the right to enter and visit the premises with any assistant or assistants, from time to time, and remain there for such time or times as may be reasonably necessary, and to examine, consider, approve or reject any writing, copy or matter printed or proposed to be printed at or issued from the said establishment or works, and after the appointment of any such person and the notification thereof to the proprietor, manager or person in charge of the said premises, no writing, copy or other matter shall be printed there or issued for publication therefrom which is not approved by the person so appointed as Censor, and any such printing or issue for publication, without such approval, shall be deemed to be a contravention of this order.

2. The printing or circulation or conveying to be printed or circulated of any letter, communication, report or news concerning the operations of the present war or the movement of any of the forces, naval or military, of His Majesty or of His Majesty's allies, or as to any of the naval or military forces or operations of His Majesty or of His Majesty's allies connected with or for the purpose of the war, or criticizing or commenting upon the policy, proceedings or action of the Government or any neutral state, if such printing or circulation or any of the statements contained in such letter, communication, report or news be likely to cause disaffection to His Majesty or to prevent, hinder or interfere with the success of the forces by land or by sea of His Majesty or of His Majesty's allies, or to prejudice His Majesty's relations with any foreign state or otherwise to assist or encourage the enemy, or to prevent, embarrass or hinder the successful prosecution of the war, shall be deemed to be a contravention of this order, and, in any prosecution for or in respect of any such offence instituted by the authority of the Attorney-General, it shall be presumed, in the absence of proof to the contrary, that the printing or circulation of the statements in respect of which the prosecution is brought were likely to cause disaffection to His Majesty or to prevent, hinder or interfere with the success of the forces by land or by sea of His Majesty or of His Majesty's allies, or to prejudice His Majesty's relations with any foreign state, or otherwise to assist or encourage the enemy, or to prevent, embarrass or hinder the successful prosecution of the war.

3. If any contravention of this order is committed, the offender shall be liable upon indictment to imprisonment for a term not exceeding two years, and to a fine not exceeding five thousand dollars, or upon summary conviction to imprisonment for a term not exceeding six months, and to a fine not exceeding two thousand dollars; and the proprietor of the premises, and every director or officer of any corporation controlling or operating the premises, where any such offence is committed, shall also be liable upon indictment or summary conviction to imprisonment and fine as aforesaid. Moreover, all copies of any book, newspaper, periodical, pamphlet, or tract printed, issued, circulated or published in contravention of this order, in the possession of whomsoever they may be, shall be seized and destroyed by any peace officer; and, if the Colonial Secretary so direct, the printing presses, plan and machinery within or connected with the premises may be closed indefinitely or for such period as the Colonial Secretary may name.

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Under the provisions of Section 6 of the War Measures Act, 1914, His Excellency the Governor in Council has been pleased to approve the following Rules and regulations:

1. No person shall without lawful authority publish or communicate any information with respect to the movement or disposition of any of the forces, ships or war materials of His Majesty or His Majesty's allies, or

with respect to the plans of any such forces or ships or with respect to any works or measure undertaken for or connected with the fortifications for defence of any place, if the information is such as is calculated to be or might be directly or indirectly useful to the enemy.

2. No person shall, without permission of the competent naval or military authority, make any photograph, sketch, plan, model or other representation of any of the forces or ships of His Majesty or of His Majesty's allies, or of any dock or harbour work in or in connection with any place in this Colony, and no person in the vicinity of such forces, ships or work, shall, without such permission have in his possession any photographic or other apparatus, or other material or things suitable for use in making any such representation. For the purpose of this regulation, the expression "harbour work" includes lights, buoys, beacons, marks and other things for the purpose of facilitating navigation in or into a harbour.

3. No person shall, by word of mouth or in writing, spread reports likely to create disaffection or alarm among any of His Majesty's forces, or among the civil population.

4. Any person who attempts to commit, or procures, aid or abets, the commission of any act prohibited by the foregoing special regulations, or harbours any person whom he knows, or has reasonable grounds for supposing to have acted in contravention of such regulations, shall be deemed to have acted in contravention of the regulations in like manner as if he had committed the act.

5. No person shall, without lawful authority, sell, give, distribute or permit the selling, giving or distributing of any newspaper, tract or pamphlet or any information which is forbidden to be published or communicated under paragraph one of these Orders and Regulations.

6. No person shall, without lawful authority, sell, give, distribute or permit the selling, giving or distributing of any photograph, sketch, plan, model or other representation which is forbidden to be under paragraph two of these orders and regulations.

7. Any person contravening any of the provisions of the foregoing Orders and Regulations shall be liable, upon summary conviction before a Stipendiary Magistrate, to a penalty not exceeding five thousand dollars, or imprisonment for any term not exceeding five years, or to both fine and imprisonment.

POSITION—On Jeans Head, the Northern promontory of the entrance to New Perlican.

DESCRIPTION—An Occulting White, Dioptric Light of the 4th Order.

PERIODS—Seven seconds light followed by three seconds eclipse, thus:

ILLUMINATED ARC—Visible in all directions seaward.

STRUCTURES—The Station comprises an octagonal wooden tower with sloping sides, and Keeper's dwelling, a one-story flat-roofed building, connected to tower by a covered passage way.

COLOUR—WHITE.

Germany's Sorry Plight

London, Nov. 1.—Germany's plans in the Riga district have been completely demoralized by the successful campaign of British submarines in the Baltic Sea, and the complete closing of the Gulf of Riga by Russian mine fields, says the Petrograd correspondent of the Post. The Germans are now endeavoring, with most feverish energy, to hasten restoration of the slender and inadequate service in their rear. This work, heretofore, has been carried on in a leisurely fashion, because of the belief that present needs could be adequately served by sea routes. This plan of campaign has been made more vital by early snow storms, which the Russians declare preface a winter of unusual severity. The belief here is that when the Germans are compelled to undergo the rigors of a real Russian winter, constantly annoyed by guerrilla attacks, and with an adequate supply of facilities, they will lose more men by sickness, and suffer greater demoralization, than comes from even the worst defeats in the field.

A Visit To The Fleet

London, Nov. 1.—Graphic descriptions of the first visit of British news paper men to Britain's Grand Fleet are published by all the morning papers. They unite in paying a tribute to the preparedness and efficiency of the British Navy, not only as to the main fighting units, but also to the less prominent, but equally important auxiliaries of various types. A naval officer, aboard one of the ships, told the correspondents that in addition to the war fleet proper, there are between 2,000 and 3,000 ships of the merchant marine, employed in transport and supply duty, and as many more engaged in patrol work or in following the destinies of enemy submarines. The visitors were shown the celebrated map on which are marked the places where German submarines have been captured, destroyed or sunk, and the various methods of meeting the submarine menace were explained to them. "We actually saw vessels engaged in this anti submarine business leaving port," says one correspondent; "indeed it is not necessary to go outside the harbor to understand why the blockade has failed. Here at anchor, alongside one another, lay bane an antidote."

One full day of the visit was spent in inspecting the large new naval works at a place which a short time ago was a swamp, but now is a live and busy naval establishment which will be large enough when completed to accommodate 20 dreadnoughts. The works include dry docks, each capable of holding any ship afloat. The party visited the short cruises Lion and Tiger, and viewed the patched funnels and shell wounds received in the North Sea battle. They also visited the Australia and New Zealand, the Colonial contributions to the High Seas Fleet.

And We do, by these Presents, further order and direct that, in the event of the Judge who may preside in the said Court in the Southern or Northern District of Our said Island being prevented, by unforeseen circumstances, from opening Our said Court on any of the days herebefore appointed, or if the said Judge should arrive at any of the places herebefore named for holding Our said Court before the time stated for the opening thereof, and should deem it proper to open the same without delay, the said Judge may, and he is hereby authorized to open and hold Our said Court on any other day or days than those herebefore specified; and to keep the same open for the respective periods herebefore stated as aforesaid, if he should find it necessary for the despatch of business to do so.

And of these Presents all Magistrates, the Sheriff, Officers of the Constabulary Force, and all Bailiffs, Constables, Keepers of Goals, and all other officers in the execution of their offices about the premises, and all and singular other persons whom these Presents do, shall or may concern, are hereby required to take due notice and govern themselves accordingly.

And that Our said Supreme Court in Circuit for the Northern District of Our said Island shall be open and holden:

At Bonaville, on Saturday, the Twenty-fifth, and Monday, the Twenty-seventh days of September next;

At Trillick, on Tuesday, the Twenty-eighth day of September next;

At Brigus, on Friday, the Nineteenth, and Saturday, the Twentieth days of November next;

At Harbour Grace, on Monday, the Twenty-second, Tuesday, the Twenty-third, Wednesday, the Twenty-fourth, and Thursday, the Twenty-fifth days of November next;

And the said Court shall be kept open for the periods herebefore prescribed, at each of the respective places, as aforesaid, provided the Judge shall have business to do therein; and, if necessary, such Judge may extend the term at any of the said places for a period not exceeding two days, and until the determination of the trial of any case then proceeding.

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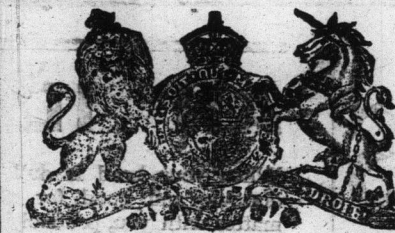
