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CONTROVERSY RE GRANTS GIVEN AIDING

Training of Nurses in Maternity Cases Lost to City by Discontinuance of Agreement SAME INSTRUCTIONS COST CITY \$500 AT PRESENT

THE QUESTION at issue between the general public hospital commission and the Salvation Army last night, in this city, was thoroughly threshed out this morning at a meeting of the council.

THE MAYOR explained the reason of the meeting at the outset. Commissioner McLellan said he had been asked to give the city \$10,000 for the training of nurses in maternity cases, but that the Salvation Army had been given the right to train nurses in maternity cases, and that the city was to pay for the training.
