FREDERICTON, Sept. 4.—The N. B. Fish, Forest and Game Protective Association is taking action in the recent big game scandal on the Miramichi, concerning which there have been many rumors afloat. The protective association has written to the Surveyor or General asking that a further investigation be carried on by the Crown Land department, and in the event of the department not taking the necessary action it looks as if the association would be compelled to do so. The department is asked to investigate the charge that while Robinson was fined for shooting only one cow mouse he really shot four mice, also that Robinson had in his employ a foreign guide contrary to the provisions of the game laws. The department has also been asked by the association to investigate the connection of Chief Game Warden John Robinson, Jr., with the case.
