#### BRILLIANT WEDDING IN GERMAIN ST. CHURCH

Church Beautifully Decorated—Mr. and Mrs. White Leave for Scotland in the Fall and for India Next Year.

Germain Street Church was the scene of one of the most brilliant society weddings of the season at half-past three o'clock yesterday afternoon when the marriage of Miss Winifred Chapman Barnaby to Captain Maurice Forbes White, M. B. of the Indian Medical Service, was solemnized in the presence of a congregation which completely filled the sanctuary.

The bride is the eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Barnaby, of Prince street, and the groom is the youngest son of the late John Forbes White, LL. D., of Craigston, Dundee and Aberdeen, Scotland.

The church was beautifully decorated for the occasion with ferns, palms and white lilies. The ceremony was directed by Geo. T. Cooper.

The bride was escorted to the altar by her father, Mr. W. H. Barnaby, and the bridesmaid, Miss E. Fisher acted as organist, and the choir was performed by Rev. W. W. McMaster, pastor of the church, Stanley E. Fisher acted as organist, and the choir was performed by Geo. T. Cooper.

Immediately after the service a reception was held at the home of the bride's parents on Princess street. There were about one hundred guests present and many beautiful presents, including jewelry, silver, china, etc.
