LONDON, Jan. 31—The re-election of J. G. Hancock, Labor candidate for the middle division of Derbyshire, announced today, completes the elections for the new Parliament in England. The remaining half dozen constituencies to make returns are Scotch and Irish. The final totals in England alone give the Unionist tariff reformers 239 seats, the Liberals and Laborites combined 227, or a Unionists majority of 12 compared with a Liberal-Labor majority of 211 received in 1908.
