Kennard's Kick That Won the Game for Harvard Against Yale Last Year.

Sometimes luck wins football contests, but generally victory comes through preparation and careful coaching.

Remember when Harvard downed Yale last fall, with a drop kick? It seemed a lucky boot, but Kennard, whose toe sent the ball tumbling over the bar, began that kick early the previous spring, when he started to practice drop kicking.


Kennard studied a football as a chess player studies his board. Upon returning to college he practiced daily to bring his kicking perfected. He was allowed to try his drop kicks behind the line against the scrubs, until in an exhibition he kicked 60 successive goals.
