**FISTIC FACTS**

The latest to make a break for the  
South Pacific are Buck Crouse and his  
manager, Jimmy Mason of Pittsburgh,  
who call the last of this month or ear-  
ly in February. They will be busy,  
for there are several good middle-  
weights in Australia.

Crouse in the last six months has  
beaten some of the best middleweights  
in this country. He is just past 21  
and gaining strength daily. He won  
over 25 battles last year, 15 of them  
being knockouts. His last victory  
was over Leo Houck and this ranks

crown.

ver English boxers, have at last de-  
cided to come to this country. Last

return to box for the London belt.

**ST. JOHN TEAM SCORES ITS  
FIRST WIN IN THE N.B.H.L.**

Fredericton, Jan. 23.—St. John's  
team playing under the name of the  
62nd Fusiliers, won their first game  
in the New Brunswick Hockey League  
this evening, defeating the Frederic-  
ton team by the narrow margin of  
a single goal, the final score being 4  
to 3. The visitors won the game in  
the opening half when they scored 3  
goals to nil for the home team, who  
didn't wake up until the second half  
when it was a lively affair until the  
finish, with the St. John team on  
the defensive almost continuously,  
with the exception of one period of  
two minutes when they took the lead  
at Percy McAvity and playing with the  
advantage of 7 men to 6 the visitors  
scored. Hallicl Lawson got the odd  
goal and it did the business for his  
team.

The superior condition of the St.  
John players cut a big figure in the  
result, several of the Fredericton  
players, notably Burden and Walker,  
being in distress and unable to stand  
the pace when the Fredericton team got  
going. Much of the hockey was of the  
slap bang variety, the players butting  
each other, taking wild swings at  
each other with their hockey sticks,  
and generally showing an inclination  
to play the man instead of the puck.
