

## NEW BRUNSWICK'S SCHOOLS IN A FLOURISHING CONDITION

Chief Superintendent, W. S. Carter, Submits Annual Report to Legislature—More than Held Own, Although Supply of Teachers not up to Demand.

The report of W. S. Carter, chief superintendent of schools, for the school year 1912-13, submitted to the legislature on Friday, says that while no doubt a better showing would have been made if the supply of teachers had been up to the demand, yet the schools have more than held their own, and slightly bettered the very satisfactory records of the previous two or three years. The numbers of pupils, teachers and schools show increases, the percentage of attendance shows a small increase, and the number of pupils in attendance is the greatest in school history.
