MARKET DOINGS STEADY AND FIRM

Shipping Stocks and Various
Industrial Specialties Made
Further Advances.

New York, March 16.—The short
session on the stock exchange today
opened with another spirited forward
movement, shippings and industrials,
in several important instances, adding
materially to gains of recent days.

Activity was heightened by reports
that the government contemplates
placing large orders for various com-
modities in the near future, pursuant
to its program of stimulating general
industry.

Rails and United States Steel were
the only noteworthy issues to lag and
further selling for profits provoked
some irregularity in the later dealings,
but the undertone at the close was
strong.

American International, whose ship-
ping interests are known to be very
extensive, led the course that an
extreme gain of almost four points,
part of which it relinquished at the
end.

Among the more stable industrials
and equipments, Harvester, Crucible
Steel and Colorado Fuel scored vari-
able advances with some of the mo-
tors and oils. Sinclair featuring the
latter division on accumulation attrib-
uted to substantial interests.

Miscellaneous issues were re-
presented by Agricultural Chemical Pre-
ferred, California Packing, Jewel Tea
and May Department Stores at gains
of 2 to 3 points, but tobacco, Dis-
tilling and metal stocks were erratic.

Sales amounted to 575,000 shares.

An actual loan expansion of \$112,000,000 with a corresponding increase
of demand deposits reflected the ac-
tivity of the week in the stock mar-
ket.

Bonds were steady with further buy-
ing of liberty 3½s the most notable
feature.

Sales, par value, aggregated \$5,675,000.

BOLSHEVIK FORCES THROWN BACK WITH HEAVY LOSSES

Attempted to Cut the Commu-
nications Between Ameri-
can and Allied Columns on
the Vaga.

Archangel, Saturday, March 16.—
(By The Associated Press)—Bolshe-
vik forces made a determined at-
tempt Friday to cut the commu-
nications between American and Allied
columns on Dvina and Vaga River,
but their attempt was repulsed with
heavy losses. The enemy lost fifty-
seven dead and four prisoners. The
Allied casualties were one soldier
wounded.

A GERMAN SUB SENT TO BOTTOM

Interned U-Boat While At-
tempting to Escape from
Ferrol, Spain, Pursued and
Sunk by Destroyer.

Paris, March 15.—The submarine
U-48 while attempting to escape from
Ferrol, Spain, last night, was chased
by a destroyer and sunk, according to
a Havas despatch from Madrid.
The U-48 took refuge at Ferrol in
March, 1918, and was interned. The
attempted flight of the U-48 was ob-
served and the torpedo boat destroy-
er Atarazuela was ordered to pursue.
The boat was sunk outside the Ferrol
roads. The crew was saved.

When the German submarine U-48
sought refuge at Ferrol, her propellers
were unshipped by the authorities,
and her guns and munitions were
taken out, according to despatches
from that port. The captain of the
submarine declared that his craft had
been damaged severely in a fight with
three ships. The U-boat carried a
crew of thirty men, and for a time a
Spanish ship, the Atarazuela, was
in the U-48's company.
