### Artists of Style And Distinction

New A. R. A. Paints Horses,  
Hounds and Cypress With  
Marvelous Skill.

London, Nov. 17.—Occasionally an artist whose name will command even over his medium, such marvellous dexterity in its use that his virtuous commands universal admiration. Such is the case with Mr. Alfred J. Munro, one of the new A. R. A.'s, who paints horses, hounds and cypresses with almost diabolical cleverness. These are mainly oil paintings, though Sargent uses water-colors and nearly equal facility. Turner was great in both.

Barrie Young, a member of the Royal Institute of Painters in Watercolor, and of the Royal Society of British Artists, who is now exhibiting at the Fine Art Society in Bond street, displays a technical dexterity in the treatment of water-colors which is little known. He paints horses, hounds and cypresses in large surfaces in big broad washes of rich transparent colors, obtaining his effects in the simplest, and apparently the easiest manner possible.

In some of his designs there is a faint suggestion of black and white, and he has a superstructure of color. The horse is a bold, strong animal, and the cypress trees generally impress by reason of their style and distinction.

Barrie Young is a romanticist, and his works in an individual way. His "Milestone," with its great red dominating green slopes of the Downs, are grand, and have much of the atmosphere of Old China, though an entirely personal vision. A delightful picture is the "Barnstormer," depicting a strolling player, and an old barn, the scene of the performance, as duly placed on the "Standard" of the Royal Society. The two small London scenes, "Albert Embankment," and "Westminster (Winter afternoon)" are gems, poetic in conception, and finely atmospheric, particularly the "Westminster," with its background of misty buildings. In each picture there is a barge with tall sail, rises above the water, and decoratively dominates the centre of the picture.

Barrie Young also paints the nude, on a much large scale than is usual for water-color, but here though as facile as ever, he is less interesting than in his landscapes.

At a house in Baggott street, cap-  
tain Newbury was shot by five men.  
He was in the front parlor of the  
house.

In the Graham Hotel two former  
officers were shot dead in a fight  
which occurred with men who are believed  
to have been "Black and Tans" who  
entered the house. In Mount street  
two men are reported to have been  
killed and a citizen wounded.

During the excitement in Mount  
street, "Black and Tans" in a lorry  
cried for help and answered  
shots. A fierce encounter ensued be-  
tween Irish volunteers and "Black  
and Tans" in which two of the former  
were killed and several volunteers  
wounded.
