Thomas Robb and Capt. J. T. Walsh Took Matter Up With Port Workers.

Thomas Robb, manager of the Shipping Federation in Montreal, and Capt. J. T. Walsh, assistant manager of the Canadian Pacific, Ltd., arrived in the city yesterday morning and during the afternoon, with local members of the Shipping Federation, met a delegation of the port workers and discussed the matter of wages and working conditions for the present season.

Business Before Common Council

Report on Water Main Renewals Which Would Provide Work for Unemployed

Commissioner Jones presented at the council meeting yesterday morning a report on the water main renewals which might be undertaken this winter to provide work for the unemployed. Among the proposed jobs is the replacing of the old cement main on the west side, the extension of the sixteen inch water main on the east side of the city, and the extension of the eight inch main in King Street from Carmarthen street to Pitt. The total estimated cost of the work proposed is about \$175,000. It was decided to hear the city engineer and Gregory on the subject.

Hon. P. J. Veniot was complaining that material had been left on the side of the road by the Canada Lock Joint Pipe Contractors for the Spruce Lake water extension and John O'Regan that debris from this work had been left on his land and done considerable damage. Commissioner Jones reported that the material complained of by Hon. Mr. Veniot would be removed and the contractors would not be released until the road was in satisfactory condition and that the conditions complained of by Mr. O'Regan had been remedied.

Commissioner Jones read a letter in which Murray and Gregory asked the city to extend the 8-inch main down Prospect street to within 700 feet of their mill, which would enable the city to assess for fire protection the company undertook to complete the extension next spring.

The engineer reported that it would mean an extension of about 300 feet and would cost about \$1,385 and the company would guarantee ten per cent on the cost. The extension would give better fire protection.

Mr. Jones said he would report further on the matter. Commissioner Jones moved that he be authorized to extend the water main from Mill street to the intersection of Viart street, and that a previous resolution requiring the residents to guarantee ten per cent of the cost be rescinded.

In reply to Commissioner Frink, Mr. Jones said he would bring in a report on the number of streets in which extensions had been made on the ten per cent arrangement.

A report on the streets in which there was no water supply at all was asked by Commissioner Jones. He thought that additions should be made should be procured for sweeping paved streets and for cleaning the catch basins.

To the mayor, Commissioner Frink said that he thought that Douglas avenue was taken over from the contractors.

The mayor said there were a few spots which might require touching up. Otherwise he thought the street was well done.

Commissioner Frink said he understood the survey of the power transmission line to Moncton was commenced last week.

Much Heralded Exodus of Mennonites Becomes Reality

Have Transferred Property to Winnipeg Land Company—Off for Mexico.

Saskatoon, Sask., Nov. 20.—The much heralded exodus of old colony church Mennonites from Western Canada to Northern Mexico is to become a reality, for arrangements have been completed whereby an advance party of 1,000 will leave the Hague district in the near future to do pioneer work on their new holdings. There are about thirty different sects of Mennonites and this is a distinct movement from that proposed by one section of Mennonites who have purchased land in South America.

The transfer of property from the Mennonites to a Winnipeg land company is near completion and under the terms of the agreement all land must be vacated by Dec. 1, 1922. The holdings of the Mennonites in the Hague district comprise 85,000 acres.

This deal is also entirely independent of the Mennonite colonies of Swift Current and Manitoba, although these people have already contracted for the purchase of blocks of land in Northern Mexico. When the trek of old colony church sect has been completed, a total of 11,000 of these people will have left Canada for Mexico.

It is against the law of the church for any of these people to do any other kind of business except farming in Western Canada. It is estimated that the old colony church members leaving the west will take with them a total of some \$14,000,000 in cash, or about \$16,000 net cash for any of these people.

CUNARD LINE SERVICE.
The Robert Reford Company, general agents for the Cunard Line Canadian Service, Canada, have received cable advice from the Cunard Steamship Company at Liverpool announcing that five of the large post war vessels will be placed on the Montreal service next spring, details of the steamers and the service in which they will operate are given herein.

The sailings will be as follows: Casablanca, May 5th; Askania to Liverpool, May 13th; Tyrhenia to London, May 20th; Antonia to Liverpool, May 27th. The Askania will come into the service on July 8th. Antonia, launched March 11th, 1921, from yards of Vickers, Limited, Barrow & Furness, England. Dimensions, 325 feet long by 37 feet beam. Gross tonnage, 14,909. Accommodation for 500 cabin, 1,200 third class. Public rooms include dining saloon, drawing room, smoking room, veranda and children's playroom, four large public rooms for third class. One funnel oil burner. Speed 15 knots.

Andania, sister ship of "Antonia," launched November 1st, 1921, from the yards of Hawthorne Leslie, Newcastle-on-Tyne.
Asonia, same type of steamer as Antonia, launched March 22nd, 1921, from the yards of Armstrong, Whitworth Company, Newcastle-on-Tyne.

Albania, launched April 17th, 1920, 340 feet long by 65 feet beam. Gross tonnage 13,000. Accommodation for 500 cabin; dining saloon, social hall, lounge and smoking room. Speed 14 knots. One funnel oil burner.
Tyrhenia, launched May 31st, 1921, from the yard of William Beard, from Montreal via Liverpool and Cherbourg to London.

These steamers will be followed very shortly by the Ascania, Alumia and Liverpool. They will augment the services indicated.
It will be observed from the foregoing that the Cunard Line with their fleet of Canadian Service steamers will take care of both the North and South of England trade as well as cater for continental business both outward and onward.

To take care of the Canadian situation during the coming winter, it has been arranged for a call at Halifax, east and west bound, several of the large New York service steamers.
