Early in January of this year, Hon. G. H. Murray brought to the attention of General Sir Sam Hughes the project of forming a Nova Scotia Highland Brigade. It was a well thought out scheme which had the endorsement of the local military authorities and the Nova Scotia recruiting committee.

After the brigade was recruited, the whole list of appointments was held up at Ottawa until a Nova Scotia Tory member could be found to represent the province in the House of Commons.

But that is not the worst of it. When it was certain that Mr. Murray's plan for raising a brigade was to succeed, in spite of the hostility of the Nova Scotia Tory members, there was a rush to control in the Tory interests the appointment of the officers who should lead it.
