STRAM LOCOMOTION ON ICE.-A young STEAN LOCOMOTION ON ICE.—A young mechanic of Kingston has employed his ingenuity in constructing a vehicle for locomoting on the, ice by steam power. The plan counits of a boat of the ordinary scow model, mounted upon runners, the rear runners on a pivot and worked by a helm for the purpose of steering. The propelling power to consist of a number of arms on each side working back and forth by the oscillation of a trank on each side of the shaf; the arms terminate in a foot, bearded in such a manner as to present no resistance in the forterminate in a foot, bearded in such a manner as to present no resistance in the forward movement, but taking the ice on the back stroke. As explained to us the working of the institution would resemble the motion of a grasshopper while dragging his jumping appendages after him in a walking gait. The idea, we believe is an old one, and the invention has been several times tried but never amounting to any practical utility. On such unprofitable inventions much time and ingenuity is wasted.
