## Letter from Field Hospital at the Front.

WRITTEN BY W. C. ARCHIBALD TO HIS FATHER IN WOLFVILLE.

Somewhere in France, Oct. 18th, 1915  
DEAR FATHER:—This is the letter which is to follow, written on my card mailed to you a few days ago. Your pleasant letters are always anxiously and eagerly looked forward to. We on this side, look forward so eagerly for news from the homeland that I am afraid we overlook the fact that a wee note is expected in return. I had a splendid letter from one of my old friends who gave as a reason for writing me before they had heard from me, that they had more time for writing than I. The letter was the more pleasant. Since Aug. 15th, or thereabouts, when we had the terrible fighting around Hooge, the hospitals have been busy. An almost fundamental rule I could make is that the more active conditions are at the front, so are we in the hospitals. Our patients to-day are mainly those injured in the recent fighting in the capture of the "Hobenzellern Redoubt" from the barbarous Germans (young Allemonds, as many of the Scots call them.) The Scotch, or kilties, in return are nicknamed by the Germans "The Women from Hell," a title which they well earn I can assure you.

What a hearty, honest, care-free, hardy lot the kilties are. To tell you truth I have fallen in love with them. They make splendid patients. I have seen one, Dannie, by name, calmly read a newspaper while the doctor made several incisions in his leg. My own opinion is that outside of the Canadians they cannot be beaten. I heard a wounded Canadian say, "Do you suppose we came all the way from British Columbia for nothing? That is a small reason why the Germans keep clear of the Canadian bayonets. How I often wish I were behind one of those bayonets! The hardest work I do is to keep contented here as a private, safe from all danger while all my old chums are along the firing line as commissioned officers and so forth."

When I was in the trenches, I would take him a few seconds to cross that space and get at the man he was stalking. Could they shoot him before that? There was some shelter where the enemy was. If the stalker could get to that spot he would be protected for a moment from the enemy's trench.

It would take him a second or two to cross that space. It a second or two what might happen? Well, he would have to chance that. At the moment the copies he was slowly approaching position. Another shot came from the nook; he must give him no chance to re-load. Now it would be a fair fight with the bayonet. He threw aside the white wraps that impeded his legs and in a dozen bounds the two men stood face to face. No shot had been fired. Yes, the magazine was empty. He heard the crunch of his enemy's feet on the snow. He rose to his feet, his bayoneted rifle extended. The two barrels struck with tremendous force. The men swayed, drew back for another thrust, and they were suddenly aware of a mist-like figure between them, a figure draped in white, lightly, diaphanously. They stood arrested, guns drawn back, and stared. The figure slowly extended its arms carrying drapery with it. A man's breast was bared. There, over the heart was a great gaping wound, fresh as if a broad, heavy blade had pierced it. There was a clatter on the ice as a gun dropped and another clatter as a similar weapon struck the stone opposite. The two men bent forward their hands outstretched. They took a step as if to touch the figure and there was nothing there! The hands met, they clasped warmly in the cold against each other.

## Hand Separator Cream.

Patrons of cream gathering creameries frequently complain of the curdling which occurs in the percentage of fat as revealed by the test of the cream delivered from time to time. These variations have given rise to more or less dissatisfaction on the part of the patrons, and have been the cause of unnecessary friction between them and the managers of creameries. A series of tests and experiments bearing on this point have recently been completed by the Branch of the Dairy and Cold Storage Commissioner of the Department of Agriculture, at Ottawa, and the results obtained are published in circular No. 14 of that Branch. It is desirable that creamery patrons should know the results of these experiments. Managers of creameries may apply for and secure from the Publications
