C A P. LXXVI.

An Act for the better Protection of the Trade of this Kingdom; and for granting new and additional Duties of Customs on Goods imported and exported, and on the Tonnage of certain Ships entering Outwards or Inwards to or from Foreign Parts, until the figning the preliminary Articles of Peace.

[28th June 1798.]

Most Gracious Sovereign,

THEREAS it will add to the Security of Trade to prevent Preamble. Ships failing without Convoy, except in certain Cases: And whereas it is expedient that certain Duties should be imposed, in order to defray the extraordinary Expence arising from the Protection given to the increased and extensive Commerce of these Kingdoms: We, therefore, Your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Commons of Great Britain in Parliament affembled, have resolved to grant to Your Majesty the Duties herein-after mentioned; and, for the Purposes aforesaid, beseech Your Majesty that it may be enacted, and be it enacted by the King's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporat, and Commons, in this referst Parliament affembled, and by the Authority of the same, From July 5. That, from and after the Fifth Day of July One thousand seven hundred and ninety-eight, it shall not be lawful for any Ship or Vessel belonging to His Majesto any of His Majesty's Subjects (except as is herein-after provided) to fail
