Let us suppose that the University Senate rejects student representation. Despite our cries, our pleadings and our unread briefs, they simply say "NO" and leave us out in the cold. All right, where do we go from there? Do we turn our backs on it all and say "screwed again"? Or do we apply a little imagination with a few dabs of organization and wage an all out war?

The university as a business enterprise (i.e. UNB) needs raw material (bodies, euphemistically referred to as students), initial capital (government grants and tuition fees), facilities (buildings, labs, typewriters, ink blotters, administrators, etc.), and lastly, a market for their product (governments, industry and business enterprises - eg. UNB), A nice neat self-perpetuating circle.

Some bodies (students) have been for some time concerned that perhaps they should have some say in this process. But because they have had no power, they have had no voice. So it seemed like the solution was to obtain power. So they very politely asked for some votes in the bodies that governed them, like the Senate and the Board of Governors. So far, there has been no meaningful success at UNB in this direction.

We must now take steps toward the Final Solution, and that is to organize our own Board of Governors and our own Senate with our own president. (Students only need apply.) With a bit of organization over the summer, we could simply instruct all registrants to pay their tuition fee money to the only legitimate power, namely, the Student Board of Governors. That would give us nearly two and a half million dollars, which is sufficient to pay the faculty members who plan to stay after CAUT censure.

Well, what about buildings? What about maintenance services? No problem at all. We would simply use the present facilities. The illegitimate Board of Governors would have no other alternative. After all, they simply can't run a university without students, and since we are the only students... it puts them in a very difficult situation. The governments certainly would not give the illegitimate board the other two thirds of the money shot unless they were processing the raw materials as promised.

Of course, the students would not follow the present elitist models before them. They would elect their president, their Board and their Senate. It would be democratic and fair and thus legitimate. Why, if the faculty or the administration wanted to have seats on our elected bodies, I am sure that if they were to present a brief, that we would give it all due consideration in due time before rejecting it. That would be the only proper thing to do. We must follow due process, you know!
