



**NOTICE OF APPLICATION
BY THE CORPORATION OF
THE CITY OF MISSISSAUGA
TO DISPENSE WITH A VOTE
OF THE ELECTORS**

TAKE NOTICE THAT:

1. The Council of the Corporation of the City of Mississauga intends to apply to The Ontario Municipal Board for approval of the works referred to in Schedule "A" hereto, at an estimated cost in respect to each work as shown in such schedule and that the sum of \$38,000 shall be raised by the sale of debentures payable out of the general rate over a period not exceeding (20) years.

2. Application will be made to The Ontario Municipal Board for an order to dispense with the assent of the electors to the undertaking of the said works. Any ratepayer may, within twenty-one (21) days after the first publication of this notice, send by post prepaid to the Clerk of the City of Mississauga at the address given below, a notice in writing stating his objection to such approval and the grounds of such objection.

3. The Ontario Municipal Board may order pursuant to the statute that the assent of the electors shall not be required and may approve of the said works, but before doing so it may appoint a time and place for a public hearing when any objections will be considered.

School board staff cuts \$1.2 million from budget

Peel board of education staff has cut \$1.2 million from the 1975 budget to meet the \$100.25 million figure set by the trustees two weeks ago.

The board's trustees had approved a general budget figure and left the staff to do the cutting.

One reduction, totalling \$255,470, involves a proposed fund for student field trips and excursions.

About \$78,000 was cut from the board's research budget. Sufficient funds will be left, however, to do a follow-up study on student dropouts, and an examination of early kindergarten entry and the continued school program of children who have received special education assistance.

A planned co-operative program with the psychiatric wing of Brampton Hospital has been cancelled, saving

\$18,000, because it appeared the venture would have been too complicated to bring into effect this year.

Cutbacks in audio-visual equipment and the leadership training program for senior staffers will total \$162,000.

Approximately \$221,000 has been cut from the additional personnel fund, originally designed to provide extra teachers for understaffed programs and for efforts at improving primary school teaching quality. All available funds will now be concentrated in the kindergarten-to-Grade 6 level and the expanded French language program. Another \$40,000 will be sav-

ed in keeping the courses and conventions budget to just above last year's level and \$50,000 will be cut from field-office budgets.

The largest single cut — of \$280,795 — involved a reduction in the capital current budget, the money spent from current funds on capital purchases and works not funded through debenturing. This year's educational tax increase will be \$38.50 on a home assessed at \$35,000. The original \$101.5 million budget would have increased taxes by \$45.

Board members say the budget is anti-inflationary, noting the tax increase has been kept to 11 percent, less than the increase in the cost of living over the past year.

The figure is somewhat inaccurate, however. This year's budget is 22 percent larger than the 1974 figure, partly accounted for by enrollment growth and inflation, but half of budget is covered by grants from the ministry of education.

'Super' sessions approved

In a plan designed to allow trustees to spend more of their summer evenings at home, Peel board of education will consolidate all committee and general meetings into one long full-board session to be held twice a month in June, July and August.

The sessions will start at 4:30 p.m. and break at 6:30 for a light supper in the board office's cafeteria.

Following the regular closed-in-committee meeting, the regular open meeting will start again at 8 p.m.

At present, a trustee can attend two or three committee meetings a week in addition to the twice monthly full-board sessions.

Crash kills 2

A Mississauga girl and a Toronto youth were killed in a head-on auto collision near Orillia Saturday evening.

Dead are Wendy Hampton, 20, of 7500 Goreway Dr., and Kenneth Brian Jacobs, 20, of Jesscoat Dr., Etobicoke. Miss Hampton was a passenger in the car driven by Jacobs.

OPP said their car was travelling south-bound on Highway 11 when it struck a north-bound vehicle head-on. The accident is being investigated by Barrie OPP.

18 OFY projects for Peel

A total of 18 projects will receive \$85,000 in grants this summer in Peel as part of the federal Opportunities For Youth program.

The 18 projects will employ 88 young people in a variety of community oriented projects, 14 of them centred in Mississauga. Often criticized in the past, the OFY programs are supervised by government project officers to ensure that their responsibility to carry out their contract as contracted, is fulfilled.

The Mississauga projects:

- Algonquin Bound — a plan to set up a camp in Algonquin Park for Peel kids age nine and up. Six employees will be hired and will cost \$7,936.
- A Child's Treasure — a plan to provide a day camp for four to nine year-olds. Costing \$3,990, it will employ four.
- Craft Fielders — an art and craft centre for kids employing six at a cost of \$7,150.
- Citizen Advocacy — a \$3,442 project to match retarded adults up with compatible adult companions. It will employ two and cost \$3,442.
- S.M.I.L.E. — a camp for retarded 12 to 18 year olds at Kelso Conservation Area employing five and budgeted for \$5,670.
- Noise — a survey about noise leading to an informative pamphlet costing \$3,900 and employing five.
- Sunshine Theatre — to perform plays for young and old residents of the region for \$7,785 and employing five.
- Sludge Utilization — a survey in Peel of the sludge utilization program. It will cost \$8,070 and employ six.
- Project Drop-In — to set up a drop-in centre for 13 to 19 year olds in Streetsville. It will hire three people and spend \$4,690.
- Statistics Malton — to study the rapid urbanization and expansion of Malton. Costing \$4,565, it will employ three youths.
- Port Credit Recreation — to set up a recreation centre for young kids with a total budget of \$6,455 and employing eight.
- Sheridan Recreation — to provide recreation for children visiting Sheridan Mall. It will cost \$3,190 and employ four.
- Creative Recreation — to set up recreation centres in the Mississauga Hospital at a cost of \$6,725 and employing five.
- Malton Youth Theatre — to set up a theatre to perform plays for area residents. It will hire seven youths and cost \$7,225.

False name nets 2 men fine, term

Two Toronto men have been fined \$300 and sentenced to one day in jail for using a false name to obtain a driver's license from the department of transport office at Dixie and Dundas.

In an earlier court appearance, Kencil MacCullum, 30, of 177 Beaconsfield Ave., and Frank Machado, 32, of 237 Borden St. pleaded guilty to charges of personation. A third man, Jose Tomas, 31, of 64 Bathurst St., Toronto pleaded not guilty and is awaiting trial.

Court was told that Machado had asked MacCullum to take a driver's license test for Tomas, and drove him to the DOT office on Dec. 2. Using the name Tomas, MacCullum signed an application for a test, but a clerk told him a birth certificate was needed and he left.

Assistant crown attorney Chip O'Connor commented that the two men "are not children and should know better."

Judge Gerry Young said that he was concerned that the men were involved in a racket, but was told by defense council that MacCullum committed the offense as a favor to a friend. In default of payment, MacCullum and Machado will serve three months.
