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private one. However, something will be given to the press, and it might be well if our friend Grange made a short report of the speeches as we go along.

MR. MURPHY:-

Speaking for myself, I decidedly object to the publication of any speeches. There has been too much publicity given to certain matters that as far as the Party is concerned would have been much better left out of print. I want to point out that this meeting is held for the benefit of the Party, and not for the benefit of any newspaper or newspapers. It will not help the object for which we are now told we have been brought here if conflicting statements are sent out, and I repeat my objection to any such publicity as has been proposed.

MR. GRAHAM:-

Well, we can arrange to have a synopsis of the proceedings carefully edited and handed out, and I would suggest that that be done by a committee composed of Mr. Pardee and Mr. Grange.

MR. PROULX:-

I move that Mr. Murphy be a member of that Committee.

This proposal carried.

Short addresses were then delivered by the following members of Parliament:-

German, Pardee, Murphy, Guthrie, Nesbitt, McCoig, Proulx, McMillan.

Messrs. Truax and Ross were also present, but did not speak.

Messrs. Pardee, Ross, Truax and one or two others left while the meeting was in progress.

The only variance in the addresses
