

Shoother, shoulder—A.S. *schuldr*.
Shune, shoes—M.E. *schon*. (V. *g-clyffe*.)
Sib, related to—A.S. *sibb*.
Sic, such—A.S. *sylic*.
Siccar, safe—A.S. *sicor*.
Sicht, sight—A.S. (*g*) *sicht*.
Siller, money—A.S. *scelfor*.
Sin, since—A.S. *sinnan*.
Sindry, sundry, asunder—A.S. *syndrig*.
Siroe me, exclamation—dear me.
Skartin', scratching.
Slap, a sharp slap, a blow—M.E. *shelp*. (York Plays.)
Slrachlin', screaming.
Slap, an opening in a wall, also a narrow pass between two hills. (Jamieson.)—Cp. "slap, to enter at a breach or opening." Northumberland, E.D.S., No. 71.
Slucky, sly, deceitful.
Smoor, smoke, dust—Flemish, *smoor*, smoke.
Snaw, snow—A.S. *snaw*.
Sneeshin, snuff—from sneezing.
Snod, neat, tidy.
Soo, a sow.
Soon'in board, sounding board.
Scoop, to sweep.
Sorn, to sponge on one; to live meanly on others—A.F. *sojerner*, to sojourn.
Spate, a flood—Cp. Irish, *speid*.
Speer, ask—A.S. *spyrian*.
Speerin', asking. "Speerin' at the lass," asking her in marriage.
Speldron, awkward—Cp. "spelder, to toss the legs awkwardly in running." (Jamieson.)
Spigget, sprigged.
Spunkie, will-o'-the-wisp—*lit.*, a small fire; from Gael. *spong*, sponge, tinder; Irish, *spong*, tinder, touch-wood.
Stead, a place, as in homestead—A.S. *stede*.
Stane, stone.
Stannin', standing—A.S. *standan*.

Stap, stave. "A stap oot o' yer bicker," a reduced quantity.
Steer, disturbance—A.S. *styrian*, to stir, disturb.
Stirk, a steer or heifer between one and two years old—A.S. *styr*.
Stour, dust in motion—O.F. *estour*, the storm of battle; E. *storm*.
Strake, sharpening strop for scythes, &c.
Strang, strong—A.S. *strang*.
Streakit, laying out a corpse—Cp. A.S. *streccan*, to stretch.
Sumph, stupid.
Sumphin', sulking.
Syne, then, since. (See Lang-syn.)

Tae, to.
Taes, toes.
Taid, toad—A.S. *tdde*.
Tairger, tiger.
Tak-tent, take care—Cp. F. *tent*, *attendre*.
Tap, top.
Tellin' mair, more to the purpose.
Thae, those—A.S. *þd*.
Theek, thatch—Icel. *þekja*, to thatch.
Thoom, thumb.
Thrawn, distorted, cross-grained—A.S. *þrawn*.
Threap, to assert pertinaciously—A.S. *þreapian*, to reprove, correct.
Threesome, three together—A.S. *þrie sum*.
Thurch stane, flat grave-stone—A.S. *þrúh-stán*.
Thunner, thunder.
Till, to—A.S. *tíl*.
Tinkler, peddler, tinker.
Tod, a fox—*tod*, a bunch of wool, flax, ivy, &c. The name is probably from the animal's bushy tail.
