COLDSTREAM GUARDS

The glories of English Army history are intimately bound up with the annals of its oldest regiment, the Coldstream Guards, whose splendid band will soon be thrilling the hearts of the Canadian public. Of all the achievements of the Guards Inkerman is perhaps the most heroic. "The conduct of the Coldstream Guards at Inkerman," says the Times of November, 1854, "should immortalize their name. These few hundred Coldstreams held the redoubt all through that grey but glorious ····· all through that grey but glorious day against as many thousands of Russians. Thrice did the hordes of Russians—their natural courage in-flamed by fanaticism and drink—rush up the hill on the top of which calm and determined stood the small force and determined stood the small force of Her Majesty's Guards. Three times were the Russians driven back only with strong reinforcements to hurl themselves again upon the diminished band. The ground was slippery with a hideous crimson slime; men slipped and recovering themselves saw that it was on a dead comrade's body that their feet had found purchase. The Coldstreams' ammunition became exhausted and in place of leaden bullets, the assailants were now met only by heavy stones. ammunition became exhausted and in place of leaden bullets, the assailants were now met only by heavy stones. The struggle soon became hand to hand, the group of Coldstreams fought back to back with clubbed muskets, and succeeded in foreing back the foe sufficiently to form line. Then ensued a companion wonder to that charge of the Coldstreams at Fuentes d'Onoro. The surging crowd of Russians were seen to waver and give way and cleaving through the mass came the remnant of the Coldstream Band with bayonets at the charge and having the mien of men who have worsted death itself.
