

# HERSCHELL'S WEATHER TABLE

For foretelling the weather, through all the Lunations of each Year, forever.

This table and the accompanying remarks are the result of many years actual observation; the whole being constructed on a due consideration of the sun and moon, in their several positions respecting the earth, and will, by simple inspection show the observer what kind of weather will most probably follow the entrance of the moon into any of its quarters, and that so near the truth, as to be seldom or never found to fail.

If the new moon, the first quarter, the full moon, or the last quarter, happen,	IN SUMMER.	IN WINTER.

*Observations.*—1. The nearer the time of the moon's change first quarter, full, and last quarter, are to midnight, the fairer will the weather be during the seven days following.

2. The space for this calculation occupies from ten at night till two next morning.

3. The nearer to mid day or noon, the phases of the moon happen, the more foul or wet weather may be expected during the next seven days.

4. The space for this calculation occupies from ten in the forenoon to two in the afternoon. These observations refer principally to the summer, though they affect spring and autumn nearly in the same ratio.
