methods, but interesting and instructive. It is a volume that will reward careful inspection.

The Sunday School Times Co., Philadelphia, sends three of their excellent little issues, each costing 60c. Our Primary Department, by William D. Murray (140 pages) is a description in detail of the equipment, programme and work of the Primary Department in Crescent Avenue Presbyterian Church, Plainville, N. J., which is famed for its admirable administration of this part of Sunday School work. The book is well worthy the attention of superintendents and Primary teachers. In Illustrations on the Beatitudes, by Sadie Eastwood (66 pages) those memorable sayings of our Lord are opened up to the comprehension of the very little ones in a charming way. The book will be especially useful to parents or teachers who contemplate picking a few flowers for the children from that most fragrant garden of the Gospels. Philip E. Howard is a strong and suggestive writer for men. His little book, Temptation: What It Is and How to Meet It (92 pages), treats this topic in a most practical way and from various points of view. The Peril of Careless Thinking, The Folly of "Just This Once", Running Past the Signals, Shall We Welcome Temptation? are among the ten suggestive chapter headings.

Laird and Lee have sent a copy of their Webster's New Standard Dictionary, Encyclopedia Edition. It is a well printed and well bound volume of 1,249 pages, with 2,000 illustrations, 23 full page plates, 9 in colors(size 7½ by 9½ inches, three-quarter leather binding \$3.00; leather cow-hide highly finished, \$4.00, both editions with patent thumb index). This is practically an Unabridged Dictionary in portable form. The text is printed in good type, the vocabulary words in bold black letters, making it exceedingly easy of reference. This Dictionary is right up to date; for example, there is a full page plate of aeroplanes, airships and baloons, and another of the fishing areas in the Great Lakes from date January 14th, 1911. A handy book, indeed, te have at one's side in library, shop, office, or schoolroom.

In Children of Persia (96 pages, 8 colored illustrations, 50c.), Mrs. Napier Malcolm coatinues Oliphant Anderson and Ferrier's (London and Edinburgh series of admirable books on child life in missionary lands. The whole series should be in ever Sunday School Missionary library. They are written from first hand knowledge, and this latest addition to the series fully sustains its reputation by its clear, circumstantial and very full account of child life in that country, whose history goes back to Bible times, but which is so much still of an unknown land to the great majority of readers.

Two excellent new books for Sunday School workers come from Revell, Toronto and New York: Dr. Ray Clarkson Harker's, The Work of the Sunday School: A Manual for Teachers (194 pages, \$1.00 net) and How to Teach a Sunday School Lesson, by H. E. Carinack (162 pages, 75c. net), with its four parts: Planning the Campaign; The Attack on the Imagination; Capturing the Emotions; Laying Siege to the Reason.
