## Winnipeg Live Stock

### Stockyard Receipts

Stockyard Receipts Liberal supplies of cattle and heavy shipments of hogs came to hand last week. The new Union yards are receiving far more than the C.P.R. yards and commission men are expecting that before long. For the last week, the Union yards received 878 cattle and 6,411 hogs. Cattle The cattle trade kept good on prime cattle, but on everything else it was slow and draggy all week. The real choice advanced up to \$7,50, while the medium and common grades were from 25 to 40 cents a hundred lower. Oven suffered the worst decline, fully 50 cents, the best only fetching \$4,75. to \$5,00, and the common \$3,25 to \$3,75. Few stockers and feeders showed up and these sold to to 15 cents per hundred lower. Mikers and springers are slow selling at the same figures. On Friday fifteen cars of cattle were shipped from Winnipeg to St. Paul, and some to the East. <u>Hogs</u> This was a his work for the hog trade the Union

The East. Hogs This was a big week for the hog trade, the Union yards receiving about 6,500 and the C.P.R. yards a goodly supply as well. The bulk sold at the C.P.R. yards for 8 cents off cars, and at the Union yards for 87 75, fed and watered. While receipts are expected to keep up, the demand shows no signs of falling off and prices should stay firm. Today, Monday, some hogs sold above 8 cents, but the probability is that this was only a temporary spurt and they will stay close to 8 cents for the rest of the week. Sheep and Lamby

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Dressed Meats Dressed pork is plentiful, and is worth 10 cents for light hogs, heavy hogs being somewhat less. Dressed beef is 12-124 cents, dressed mutton 124 cents, veal 13 cents and lamb 15 cents. Everything except pork seems to be hard to get and the trend is higher.

Hides, Wool, Tallow Hides, Local firms are quoting: Cured hides, 114 cents per 1b., delivered in Winnipeg; frozen green hides, 103 to 11 cents; western branded hides, 103 to 11 cents; sheepskins and lambskins, 15 to 35 cents each. Tallow—No. 1 tallow is worth 5 to 53 cents lb.; No. 2, 4 to 43 cents, delivered to the trade. Wool—Manitota wool is bringing 103 to 113 cents per 1b. for coarse; 114 to 123 cents for medium. Seneca Root—42 to 45 cents per pound.
