GERMAN TROOPS BEING WITHDRAWN

London, Sept. 8.—Large numbers of German troops continue to pass Liege on their way back to Germany, says an Antwerp despatch.

ALLIES ARE NOW MAKING HEADWAY

London, Sept. 8.—A despatch to Reuters from Paris reviewing the situation in that quarter says that according to official statements the allies had advanced about ten miles up to noon Monday.

This latest news from the front has produced an excellent impression in Paris.

Unofficial news brought back by soldiers returning from the front is even more encouraging than the official statements, and the people here are convinced that things could not be going better for the success of the French arms.

Steam Trawler Sunk

London, Sept. 8.—Another Grimby steam trawler, the Revige, was blown up by a mine.

The skipper and two engineers are injured but the rest of the crew are saved.

Electric Storm

A thunder and lightning storm of great severity swept over the Island last night and did not abate until 3.30 this morning. The peals of thunder were the loudest and longest for some time and many citizens were kept awake for hours.

Although the storm was so heavy no damage is reported.

The Postal Telegraphs had to cease work for several hours, but the lines are again working satisfactorily.

Belgians Blew Up Last Liege Fort; General Leaman Was Found Alive

That is How He Was 'Taken' Prisoner by Germans—In Conference With Officers He Decided to Die at Fort

Paris, Sept. 3.—The Antwerp correspondent of "The Petit Parisien," gives this explanation of the presence of General Leaman, the Belgian commander at Liege in Magdeburg, as a prisoner of war:

"On August 17, General Leaman was summoned by the Germans to surrender the Liege forts. He refused, but as the situation was then desperate, and it was impossible to hold out against another bombardment, he called his officers together in fort

London, and said: 'You have valiantly fought for your country, but the struggle has become impossible, and it is foolish to try further. The hour is come when we must separate. I have decided to die here. Leconin shall be my tomb.'

"All the officers declared that they would still fight, and would die with their general. Again the cannon thundered, than those in the fort were silenced and a terrible explosion took place. General Leaman and his officers had blown themselves up. Alone of all in the forts, General Leaman survived and from the debris he was taken a prisoner to Magdeburg. It was on Emperor William's order that he was allowed to keep his sword."

GREY-HAIRED MEN STRENGTHENING PARIS DEFENCES

Observers Say the Kaiser Has Called His Last Available Reserves to the Colors

London, Sept. 7.—A despatch to The Times from Ostend reports that arrivals from Brussels states that many of the Landstrum troops drilling daily are men with white hair which, the correspondent says, shows that Germany has called up every man able to bear arms.

Similar statements are made by those who have seen the German soldiers proceeding north to Antwerp.
