Saloniki, Feb. 3—The Zeppelin, which on Tuesday bombarded Saloniki was of very large dimensions. After making a wide detour of the city, it began its operations by droping five bombs which fell into the sea. The warships opened fire on it, but after fourteen shots, were obliged to cease for fear of wounding the population which was now filling the streets. The raiders missed the next target, but tore a woman to pieces and wounded a small boy. Another bomb set fire to the warehouses filled with fats, oils, benzine and sugar. The buildings flared up like a torch and the population became wildly excited. A company of French gendarmes and a picket of Zouaves hurried up and restored a semblance of order. They brought a volunteer fire brigade with hand pumps through the mob. Meanwhile the Zeppelin continued to rain down its missiles of destruction, one of which demolished the mosque of Yussof Pasha, killing three and injuring eleven Greek refugees from Asia Minor, who were sheltered in it.
