Appeal for 25,000 Additional Workers in Pennsylvania Coal Fields

Philadelphia, Jan. 18.—The general committee of anthracite operators issued an appeal to-day for 25,000 additional men to work in the hard coal mines of Pennsylvania.

"Although last year's shipments of anthracite exceeded 77,000,000 tons, nearly 16,000,000 tons more than ever before," said the appeal, "production must be further increased. The record output has proved insufficient to meet enormous enlarged war demands. Labor is essential now. The industry is short-handed. It has only 122,000 mine workers, as against 177,000 in 1916. The mining operations are developed sufficiently to enable an immediate increase in production could the necessary labor be had.

"The anthracite operators realize that abnormal weather and railroad congestion have curtailed the present supply, but are keenly alive to meet the new, enlarged and imperative demands for coal. If the supply is to be increased every citizen should lend his support to the effort that the labor force in Pennsylvania's anthracite region be maintained and increased."

Reports from the anthracite district last night said the railroad congestion was unprecedented. Between Shamokin and Mahanoy City forty miles of sidings were blocked with ore from the upper lakes amounting to 62,498,901 tons, while the movement of grain aggregated 7,161,716 net tons. The business outlook for 1918 was characterized as "reasonably satisfactory."

Accidents on the lakes resulted in the loss of seven lives and twenty-two vessels. The loss of vessels, however, it was stated, was confined mainly to wooden tonnage, chiefly barges and schooners.

"While no further increase in the association's tonnage may be hoped for until the end of the war," the report continued, "the present membership of the association represents 420 vessels, aggregating 2,084,922 tons, an amount adequate for successfully handling almost any burden the nation may impose.

LABOR NEWS

According to a report issued by the Fisheries Department at Ottawa the increased demand for fish and the high prices prevailing made a new record in the value of Canadian fish products during the past fiscal year, amounting to \$39,208,378.

The system federation of the mechanical shop crafts on the Intercolonial Railway is in a very healthy condition at this present time, and it is proposed to appoint a business representative who will devote his entire time to the interests of the organization.

James Watt, general organizer of the Journeymen Tailors International Union, has succeeded in reorganizing the local union in the city of Hamilton, which lapsed some time ago.

Since then attempts to revive it have ended in failure, but Jim got down to work in earnest and had the satisfaction not only of getting the union upon its feet again, but to see it officered by a bunch of live wires who can be depended upon to see that it goes right.

The Co-operative Society of Sydney Mines, N.S., has apparently been making phenomenal progress during the three months ending with October 31st, as the official quarterly report shows that during that time there had been an increase in the business of the society of \$57,572.21 over the corresponding period of the previous year. The total sales for the quarter were \$141,324.95.

The society also started a new branch store at Cranberry No. 2, on November 1st, and the cash taken in for sales during the first three weeks averaged \$700 per week, and was steadily growing.

The Canadian Cartridge Company of Hamilton has received a large order from the United States War Department for the manufacture of brass cartridge cases. It is said the contract is for so large an output that it will last for months to come and comes at an opportune time, as it will place the company in a position to retain a large staff, many of whom would probably have been let off shortly because of a slackening up of war orders from Great Britain.

The Independent Labor Party in Nova Scotia is full of fight, and has determined to put up candidates for the coming provincial election in Sydney and Pictou. Conventions for the purpose of selecting working class representatives have been called, and it is claimed by the laborites that the good showing made in the federal elections by the labor candidates in spite of the disenfranchisement of many hundreds of legitimate voters makes it
