The Late Mrs. J. K Lancaster Honored.

Handsome Tablet Unveiled to Her Memory

Placed in St. John's Church by the Parishioners.

The memory of the late Mrs. J. K. Lancaster has been perpetuated in a handsome mural tablet, which was unveiled at St. John's church on Friday evening, 15th inst. The tablet is in the form of a beautiful design of white marble, the lettering being done in gold. The inscription is as follows:-

> ERECTED BY THE PARISHIONERS OF ST. JOHN'S CHURCH IN LOVING MEMORY

JANE KNOX LANCASTER DEPARTED THIS LIFE MARCH 8, 1905

"BLESSED ARE THE DEAD WHICH DIE IN THE LORD."

Rev. H. Caplan officiated, and after the Litany had been said, dedicated the tablet, the unveiling being done by Mrs. Wm. Webb, on behalf of the parishioners, who presented the tablet to the glory of God and the beloved memory of the late departed lady.
