WHAT TO WEAR IN BELTS.

The Shaped Kind Are Most Becou ing to the Average Person. High belts are still popular, but experience teaches that they must be made with care if they are to be worn with the straight front corset. The prettiest belts are made high at the back. The material is cut on the cross and is mounted on the bodice. The belt slopes gradually toward the front. Often the belt does not meet in front by a couple of inches, the intervening space being hidden by a tie of lace or a portion of the vest. For wearing with shirt waists a useful belt is made of crosscut glace or soft satin matching the color of the skirt. It is folded and stitched to a bone about four inches long at the back, and thence on either side the material slopes away
