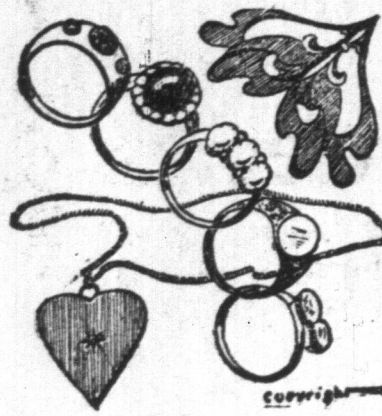

For Leather Chairs.

The following polish improves leather chairs wonderfully: Boil half a pint of linseed oil. Let stand till nearly cold and then stir in half a pint of vinegar. Stir till thoroughly mixed and bottle for use. When needed, shake the bottle well, pour a very little on a soft flannel, rub thoroughly into the leather, turning the flannel as it gets dirty, and rub with soft dusters till the polish of the leather is restored.

Blisters.

When bluing is used in washing, be sure that all soap is rinsed from the garment first, as many bluing are prussian blues. This bluing is a compound of two iron salts, which are precipitated by alkalis. This accounts for many of the iron rust spots found on clothing and shows the necessity for thorough rinsing.

SAD DEATH

The sad news of the death of C. M. Brant, of Blenheim, was brought into the city this morning. Mr. Brant had the typhoid fever and was taken worse yesterday, dying last evening.

POISONED HIM

Charge on Which a 17-year-old Widow is Arrested—Suspected of Husband's Death.

Syracuse, N. Y., Oct. 18.—Mrs. William A. Kiehl, 17 years of age, of South Onondaga, was arrested to-day and taken to Cortland on the charge of killing her brother-in-law, Adam Kiehl, with strychnine. Her husband died suddenly in February. It is said that she was infatuated with Adam, and the night following her husband's funeral asked him to marry her. Adam did not return her affections, and the woman became very jealous. On September 19, after a day's work on a farm at Preble, Adam Kiehl went to bed, apparently well, and was found dead in bed in the morning. Pneumonia was given as the cause. The sudden death of the brothers was regarded as suspicious, and an investigation was made by the coroner. The body of Adam Kiehl was exhumed and the stomach and other organs were sent to the chemistry department at Cornell University. Professor Chasmon reported that he found strychnine in the viscera. It is believed by the coroner that the poison was put in the tea which Kiehl drank. When Mrs. Kiehl was taken to jail she broke down, and cried piteously, declaring her innocence.
