The act, however, compels investigation by a board of conciliation and investigation before a strike or lock-out can take place in any mine. Mr. Acland will endeavor to induce the strikers to apply for a board of conciliation and return to work pending its findings.

and Foreland Reeves, chairman of the committee, yesterday, asking, on account of the strike, if the Provincial Secretary could prevent the express companies from carrying liquor to the station until the strike be settled. The hotelkeepers at Haileybury and Latchford, it was stated, had promised not to sell any liquor in packages. The Government, Mr. Hanna said, had taken the matter up with the T. & N. O. railway commission and the express companies operating, and had

ex N. O, railway commission and the express companies operating, and had urged that no express packages whatever containing liquor be forwarded pending the settlement of the strike.

The Government also gave instructions to the license commissioners in the district to see to it that the hotels at New Liskeard and Latchford do not sell any needs to leave the light and the latest and leave the light and the latest and leave the light and light and leave the light and light

not sell any package liquor. Should the hotels be found contri-

Should the hotels be found contributing to drunkenness the commissioners are so to report, and the licenses will be suspended or canceled. It is definitely stated that the owners of Cobalt mines have banded together and have already taken steps to enlist the aid of the Ontario Government in settling the strike of miners.

The order will take nine months to complete.

It is stated that it was given in Germany because the British works are already working to their full capacity to turn out Dreadnought armament for British and foreign ships. As many as 120 12-inch guns are now being built in England. The Japanese commissioners found that the ese commissioners lound British gunmakers had not expanded to the their plants proportionately to the demand for big guns created by the general adoption of the Dreadnought armament, while the Krupps, within two years, have enlarged their plant at Essen by extensions costing \$15,000,000, and increased the staff from 24,000 to 30,000 men.
