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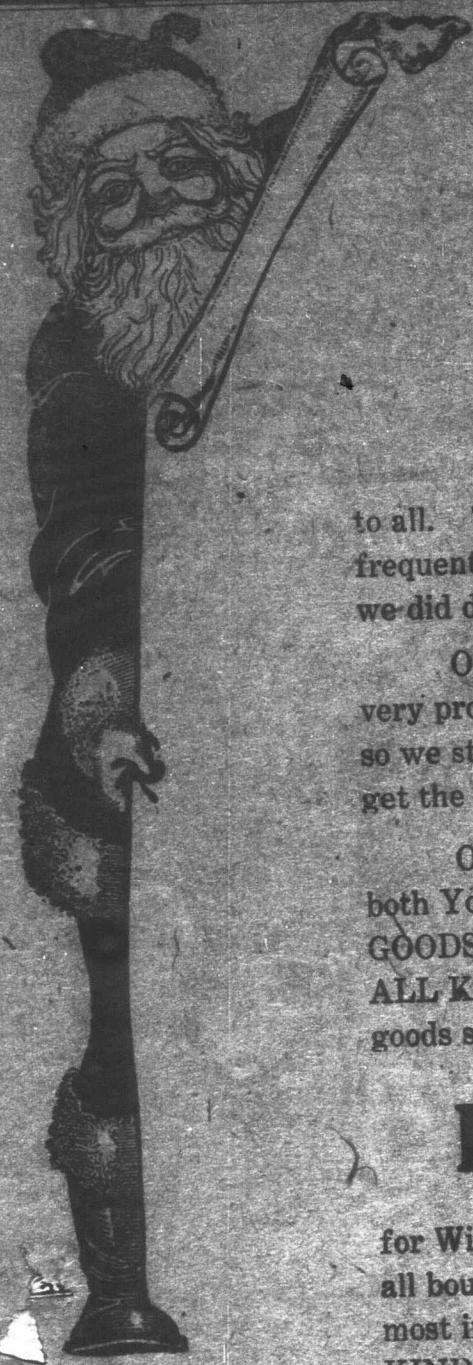

QUESTIONS YOU MUST ANSWER

First Week of the New Year to be Observed as National Service Week, When Information is to be Secured Regarding the Man Power of Canada

The first week of the new year is to be observed as National Service week, and during that time an inventory of the man power of Canada is to be made. The idea is to secure all information regarding the resources of the Dominion so that adjustments may be made in our national life for the maintenance of the agricultural and other basic industries of the Dominion at the necessary high point of production, an efficiency, and to insure the maximum production of war material and equipment by utilizing the services of all available men, and women of Canada in such a manner as will permit of the release from their present employment of men who, physically fit and of suitable age, may desire to serve overseas with our military or naval forces.

Realizing that the creation of a sound public opinion is essential, R. B. Bennett, Director-General of National Service in Canada, has sent personal communications to all the school teachers, doctors, clergymen, newspapers, lawyers, secretaries of Canadian clubs, labor, fraternal and benefit organizations, seeking their active support and assistance. Arrangements have also been made for a publicity campaign in the newspapers, periodicals of the Dominion, and the screens in moving picture houses on New Year's day may also be utilized. The Prime Minister has addressed a series of public meetings throughout Canada on National Service.

The list of questions on each of the National Service cards to be sent out is as follows: The card is to be filled in by males between the ages of sixteen and sixty-five inclusive, and each question is to be answered plainly:

1. What is your full name?
2. How old are you?
3. Where do you live?

4. Name of city, town, village or post office?
5. In what country were you born?
6. In what country was your father born?
7. In what country was your mother born?
8. Were you born a British subject?
9. If not, are you naturalized?
10. How much time have you lost in last twelve months from sickness?
11. Have you full use of your arms?
12. Of your legs?
13. Of your sight?
14. Of your hearing?
15. Which are you—married, single or a widower?
16. How many persons besides yourself do you support?
17. What are you working at for a living?
18. Whom do you work for?
19. Have you a trade or profession?
20. If so, what?
21. Are you working now?
22. If not, why?
23. Would you be willing to change your present work for other necessary work at the same pay during the war?
24. Are you willing, if your railway fare is paid, to leave where you now live, and go to some other place in Canada to do such work?

Mrs. E. F. Shaw Dead at Bath

About 9:30 on Saturday evening Mary, wife of Elijah F. Shaw, J. P. of Bath, succumbed to a stroke of paralysis. She suffered a first stroke last summer but had recovered sufficiently to be around the house. The fatal shock came early in the evening and caused intense suffering until she passed away.

Mrs. Shaw was a daughter of the late Cornelius and Frances Phillips and was born at Somerville 69 years ago. She is survived by one brother, Eliza S. Phillips of St. Thomas, Ont. The late Rev. C. T. Phillips, D. D., was a brother, and H. M. Stevens of Hartland is an uncle. She had no children of her own, but the late Mrs. J. R. H. Simms was an adopted daughter.

The funeral was held on Tuesday.

WORST STORM IN SEVERAL YEARS

Nearly Two Feet of Snow Blown by Fierce Gale Forms Blockade

The snowstorm and gale that set in on Friday evening and continued for three days was the most fierce and widespread that has visited this section in years. It made the proverbial "old residents" sit up and ponder. It sure was like the winter of long ago of which the younger generation have heard, but have only half believed, and certainly never expected to see.

Beginning about eight o'clock on the evening of Friday the wind blew from the east, bringing a heavy snow fall. Saturday morning showed fences buried, roads full and travelling at a standstill.

Trains were delayed from all points, except that the express from Edmundston ran sharp on time. The express from the south arrived five hours late, as was the evening train from the south. The railway management, however, experienced no such difficulty as they used to contend with in the days of light engines and inadequate equipment. Monday trains were only slightly delayed in spite of continued down-fall of snow.

Country roads are badly blocked and, while no one wanted to see a green Christmas, almost too much snow fell to insure a good "Christmas week" trade.

The storm extended all over the maritime provinces and Maine, and the snow is reported to have amounted to a total fall of about two feet—more and less in different localities. During the whole progress of the storm the temperature did not run low, and the river remained open.

Winter has started most energetically, and if it proves severe as the past week indicates it will be, it will but prove the truth of the old saying that "one extreme follows another." The past summer and autumn have been seasons of long to be remembered deliciousness.
