The United Baptist church was or ganized in 1996 and is a combination of the former Baptist church and the Free Baptist church. The Observer en given the following data with regard to the early history of the Bap-tist church in Hartland. "In the year 1890. George C. Watson and family came to Hartland from Jacksontown. They were very sealous in the work of the church and their home was always a welcome place for the Baptist ministers. At about this time a considerable interest in this particular demination was started by Rev. C. H. Henderson and a small society was church was organized in the Metho-dist meeting house with Rev. H. D. Warden as pastor. The organization was largely due to the falthfulness of the late Rev. A. H. Hayward who spent his life in the interests of the Baptists. When the new church was sainted there were twenty-two charter members, Judson Currie, and George C. Watson were chosen as deacons and W. D. Keith as clark. The growth and W. D. Keith as clerk. The growth of the little church was rapid and in 1895 a lot was donated by the late hen] Jowett and a church building was commenced. This was dedicated in 1898, Among the pastors in the successive years were Revs. H. D. Warden, A. H. Hayward, J. D. Wetmore and

The Free Bap-tist church at Hartland (then called the Mouth of the Beccaguimac) was organized in the year of 1843 after a gracious revival under the labours of the late Rev. G. W. Orser, who was the pastor for more than thirty years. The services were held in a little chool-house at the north and of the town.
