Owing to numerous attractions, the crowd was not as large as it might have been desired but nevertheless, everybody seemed to have a good time. As regards this, the Centreville correspondent, who was present, has an outsider's view. The baseball game was the chief feature of the picnic and was witnessed by a large number. It was the first game of the season for both the Hartland and Centreville teams. The visitors were to bat first and secured one run. When the Hartland team came up Jimmy Lavigne took a fair swipe at the first ball over the plate and knocked it out into the river, a distance of more than 350 feet. He made the complete circuit with time to spare. Among the baseball club there is a standing offer of a pair of shoes for anyone putting the ball in the river. Thus Lavigne wins. The game up to the fifth inning was in favor of Centreville. In the last half of the fifth Hartland evened up and from then on the home team scored steadily, three men coming in to the plate at almost the same moment. Death of John H. Reid

The death occurred on Sunday evening of John H. Reid who for more than 20 years has been a respected resident of the town. He was of advanced age and had been in failing health for a long period. For a number of years he conducted the boarding house at Bayre's mill. Mr. Reid is survived by his wife, one son, Harvey T., who is attending Oxford University as a Rhodes scholar, and by three daughters, Miss Lyde M., Miss George and Mrs. George Wilkins. The funeral was held at the United Baptist church on Tuesday afternoon, May 25, at 2 o'clock, the Rev. B. A. Trives presiding, the sermon. The sympathy of the community goes out to the bereaved family.

Mrs. John Irvine

The death occurred on Tuesday morning at her home at Mount Pleasant of Mrs. John Irvine. She was stricken with paralysis since which time her condition has grown more and more serious. Besides her husband she is survived by four sons: Benjamin, who lives at Hartland, Arthur in Portland, Robert and Harry at home; and two daughters, Mrs. Rupert Harris at Hartland and Mrs. Mervel Rideout at Coldstream. Interesting Case Over an Auto Tried in Local Police Court

The Hartland police court is rapidly assuming a cosmopolitan character as on Friday of last week Thomas Lee and Robert Lee of Bridgeport, Connecticut, were before Police Magistrate Kelly, charged with stealing parts from an auto belonging to Ernest Dyer of Bristol.

It appeared by the evidence for the prosecution that Robert Lee offered to sell to Dyer's brother, who lives in Bridgeport, a 1920 Overland car for \$300.

Dyer communicated with his brother at Bristol, who sent Fred Rogers to Bridgeport with \$300 in cash, which was paid over to Lee, and Rogers took delivery of the car, driving it home.

The Lees then came to Bristol, endeavoring to buy the car, and, failing that, removed an essential part of the car so that Dyer could not run it.

The Americans were unable to move the car for the simple reason that a small but essential part was in Dyer's pocket.

Dyer then issued a warrant for their arrest, and Thomas Lee was fined \$40, as evidence showed that he was the party who removed the parts from the car. The Lees in their evidence denied positively that there had been any sale of the car, and claimed that it had been stolen, but the Magistrate accepted Dyer's evidence on that point. M. L.
