No. 109 HORSE CAR MANNERS.

Men Lacking in Manners, and Women Who Are to Some Extent Responsible.

"The manners of people in Brooklyn and New York horse cars are abominable," said an elderly gentleman who stood on, the rear platform of a Fulton street car the other day. "I am a traveling man," he continued, "and have had occasion to make a study of this subject. For instance, just take a look inside this car and you will see what I mean. First you will notice that while several ladies are standing several men are sitting. That you will say is nothing unusual, nor is it in our cars.
