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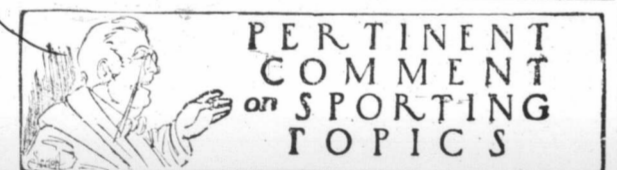

### Only Three of U. N. B. Champs Will be Missing Next Year

All Except Capt. Balkam, Murphy and Jewett Are Expected to Return to Defend the Clark Cup—Acadia Loses Five Players, While Mount A. Will Lose None.

When Capt. "Dine" Maiman calls for candidates at College Field next fall he will have twelve veteran regular players on the toes once more to do battle for the Red and Black. The three players who have played their last Intercollegiate football game are Captain "Curly" Balkam, "Red" Murphy and "Tonkey" Jewett. The last named will be at U. N. B. next fall, but will be ineligible owing to the new five year rule in vogue, which calls for a player participating only five years in Intercollegiate football. Balkam and Murphy are both half-backs, while Jewett has graced the precincts of U. N. B. scrims for the past five years. All three have been sterling players and were never on the bench on the teams they played.

Now as to the players remaining, there are Capt. Malman, Edcombe, O'By, Burden, McPherson, McLean, Atkinson, Saunders, Townsend, Kuhring, Marsters Milledge and Melrose. Besides these regulars "Hump" Campbell and "The Dane" will have Gibson, Vanwart, Babbitt, Turner and Hal all substitutes of the 1914 championship fifteen.

When 1915 rolls around, however, all these players will be gone, if it is true, but from their own statements made after the Acadia game, nearly all will be at College Field when the call for Intercollegiate football comes in his senior year at U. N. B. may defer the taking of his B. A. degree another year. Melrose may not return to college, or at least he may only one who is really undecided as to re-entering U. N. B. next fall. All the rest are to be there, so Coach Campbell will have a great foundation with which to build another championship team.

While the U. N. B. situation looks very rosy, Acadia and Mount A. are not going to lose many players next June, so all three will go into the game once more with very little advantage as far as veteran players are concerned.

**The Acadia Team.**  
At Acadia five of this year's team will be missing when the erstwhile champions take the field next year. They are McKay, the centre lock forward, who incidentally just finished his sixth season; Spencer, also a forward; Roscoe, another forward; L. Harlow, wing half, and Len Richardson, quarterback. Moore, Leaman, Easton, MacCurdy, Parker, Archibald, Atkins, Bishop, R. Harlow and Steeves will all turn out when Coach Chipman gives the call, giving Acadia ten veterans to build with. Capt. "Gammy" Atkins was all "cut up" over losing the championship this year after playing on three championship teams, and wants to play on a team that can win his stepfather's cup. Therefore "Gammy" will be back at Acadia

after all. Under these circumstances the green ones which showed lots of speed last season, but were carried over, must look pretty good to their owners about now.—J. D. B.
