INSPECTORS SEIZE THREE CASES ALE

177 Cases of Liquor Arrive in
St. John Friday Addressed
to as Many Individuals.

St. John, April 3.—Three cases of
strong ale were seized this morning
at the office of the Dominion Express
Co. by Inspectors McManis and Keen
on the grounds that they were im-
properly addressed. That the citizens
of St. John are not suffering from the
drought which is supposed to accom-
pany prohibition is indicated by the
fact that no less than 170 cases of
liquor, mostly whiskey, arrived in the
city yesterday, addressed to almost as
many individuals.

THE METHODISTS TO MEET AT VANCOUVER

Conference to Assemble There
on May 13 and Arrange-
ments Completed.

Vancouver, B. C., April 3.—Many
eastern Methodist church leaders are
expected to be in Vancouver for the
4th annual session of the Methodist
Conference which meets here May 13.
The programme committee has al-
ready completed its arrangements.
The stationing committee will meet on
Monday, May 10, and other commit-
tees will hold meetings early so that
they may have everything in readiness
for the opening of the conference.
This year more than ordinary interest
will centre in the reports as all rec-
ords will be passed, the Forward
Movement having given a great im-
petus to church work generally.

MEDICINE HAT HAS RENTAL TAX

Edmonton, Alta., April 3.—Medicine
Hat was given the right to institute a
tax on rental value of all properties
by the municipal law committee of the
legislature which considered amend-
ments to the Medicine Hat charter.
The tax will be ten per cent. of the
rental value of property and will be
collected from all occupiers of prop-
erty whether owners or tenants. The
city was also given the right to in-
stitute a poll tax of \$10 per person,
which, however, is offset against any
other taxes paid, so that it will catch
only those who pay no other taxes.
