LEAGUE OF NATIONS COVENANT, AS COMPLETED, SHOWS MANY CHANGES

Washington, April 27—The State Department made public tonight the text of the revised covenant of the League of Nations, as it will be presented tomorrow to the plenary session of the peace conference at Paris. The text follows:

ARTICLE ONE
The original members of the league or nations shall be those of the signatories which are named in the annex of this covenant and also such of those other states named in the annex as shall accede without reservation to this covenant. Such accessions shall be effected by a declaration deposited with the secretariat within two months of the coming into force of the covenant. Notice before shall be sent to all other members of the league.

Any fully self-governing state, dominion or colony not named in the annex may become a member of the league if its admission is agreed by two-thirds of the assembly, provided that it shall give effective guarantees of its sincere intention to observe its obligations and shall accept such regulations as may be prescribed by the league in regard to its military and naval forces and armaments. Any member of the league, after two years notice of its intention so to do, withdraw from the league, provided that all its international obligations and all its obligations under this covenant shall have been fulfilled at the time of its withdrawal.

ARTICLE TWO
The action of the league under this covenant shall be effected through the instrumentality of an assembly and of a council, with a permanent secretariat.

ARTICLE THREE
The assembly shall consist of representatives of the members of the league. The assembly shall meet at stated intervals and from time to time as occasion may require, at the seat of the league, or at such other place as may be decided upon.

The assembly shall deal at its meetings with any matter within the sphere of action of the league or affecting the peace of the world. At meetings of the assembly, each member of the league shall have one vote, and may have not more than three representatives.

ARTICLE FOUR
The council shall consist of representatives of the United States of America, of the British empire, of France, of Italy, and of Japan, together with representatives of four other members of the league. These four members of the league shall be selected by the assembly from time to time in its discretion. Until the appointment of the representatives of four members of the league first selected by the assembly, representatives of (blank) shall be members of the council.

ARTICLE FIVE
Except where otherwise expressly provided in this covenant, decisions at meetings of the assembly or of the council shall require the agreement of all the members of the league represented at the meeting.

All matters of procedure at meetings of the assembly or the council, the appointment of committees to investigate particular matters, shall be regulated by the assembly or by the council, and may be decided by a majority of the members of the league represented at the meeting.

The first meeting of the assembly and the first meeting of the council shall be summoned by the president of the United States of America.

ARTICLE SIX
The permanent secretariat shall be established at the seat of the league. The secretariat shall comprise a secretary-general and such secretaries and staff as may be required.

The first secretary-general shall be the person named in the annex; thereafter the secretary-general shall be appointed by the council with the approval of the majority of the assembly.

The secretaries and the staff of the secretary-general with the approval of the council.

The secretary-general shall act in that capacity at all meetings of the assembly and of the council. The expenses of the secretariat shall be borne by the members of the league, in accordance with the appointment of the expenses of international bureau of the universal postal union.

ARTICLE SEVEN
The seat of the league is established at Geneva. The council may at any time decide that the seat of the league shall be established elsewhere. All positions under or in connection with the league, including the

secretariat, shall be open equally to men and women.

Representatives of the members of the league and officials of the league when engaged on the business of the league, shall enjoy diplomatic privileges and immunities.

ARTICLE EIGHT
The members of the league recognize that the maintenance of a peace requires the reduction of national armaments to the lowest point consistent with national safety and the enforcement by common action of international obligations.

The council, taking account of the geographical situation and circumstances of each state, shall formulate plans for such reduction for the consideration and action of the several governments.

Such plans shall be subject to reconsideration and revision at least every ten years.

After these plans shall have been adopted by the several governments, limits of armaments therein fixed shall not be exceeded without the concurrence of the council.

The members of the league agree that the manufacture by private enterprise of munitions and implements of war is open to grave objections. The council shall advise how to secure the abolition of such manufacture, and shall take such measures as may be necessary for their safety.

ARTICLE NINE
A permanent commission shall be constituted to advise the council on the execution of the provisions of articles I and 8 on military and naval questions generally.

ARTICLE TEN
The members of the league undertake to respect and preserve as against external aggression the territorial integrity and existing political independence of all members of the league. In case of any such suggestion of such aggression, the council shall advise upon the means by which this obligation shall be fulfilled.

ARTICLE ELEVEN
Any war or threat of war which immediately affecting any of the members of the league or not, is hereby declared and the league shall take any action that may be deemed wise and effectual to safeguard the peace of nations. In case any such emergency should arise, the secretary-general shall, on the request of any member of the league, forthwith summon a meeting of the council.

It is also declared to be the fundamental right of each member of the league to bring to the attention of the assembly, or the council any circumstance whatever affecting international relations which threatens to disturb either the peace or the good understanding between nations upon which peace depends.

ARTICLE TWELVE
The members of the league agree that if there should arise between them any dispute likely to lead to a rupture, they will submit the matter either to arbitration or to inquiry by the council, and they agree in no case to resort to war until three months after the award by the arbitrators or the report of the council.

In any case under this article, the award of the arbitrators shall be made within a reasonable time, and the report of the council shall be made within six months after the submission of the dispute to the council.

ARTICLE THIRTEEN
The members of the league agree that whenever any dispute arise between them which they recognize to be suitable for submission to arbitration and which cannot be satisfactorily settled by diplomacy, they will submit the whole subject matter to arbitration of a treaty, as to any question of international law, as to the existence of any fact which if established would constitute or as to the extent and nature of the reparation to be made for any such breach, are declared to be among those which are generally suitable for submission to arbitration and which cannot be satisfactorily settled by diplomacy, they will submit the matter to a court agreed upon by the parties to the dispute or stipulated in any convention existing between them. The members of the league agree that they will carry out full good faith any award that may be renewed and that they will not resort to war against a member of the league which complies therewith. In the event of any failure to carry out such an award, the council shall propose what

steps should be taken to give effect thereto.

ARTICLE FOURTEEN
The council shall formulate and submit to the members of the league for adoption plans for the establishment of a permanent court of international justice. The court shall be competent to hear and determine any dispute of an international character which the parties thereto submit to it. The court may also give an advisory opinion upon any dispute or question referred to it by the council or by the assembly.

ARTICLE FIFTEEN
If there should arise between members of the league any dispute likely to lead to a rupture, which is not submitted to arbitration as above, the members of the league agree that they will submit the matter to the council. Any party to the dispute may effect such submission by giving notice of the existence of the dispute to the secretary-general, who will make all necessary arrangements for a full investigation and consideration thereof. For this purpose the parties to the dispute will communicate to the secretary-general, as promptly as possible, statements of their case, all the relevant facts and papers; the council may forthwith direct the publication thereof.

The council shall endeavor to effect a settlement of any dispute, and if such efforts are successful, a statement shall be made public giving such facts and explanations regarding the dispute, terms or settlement thereof as the council may deem appropriate.

If the dispute is not thus settled, the council either unanimously or by a majority vote shall make and publish a report containing a statement of the facts of the dispute and the recommendations which are deemed just and proper in regard thereto.

Any member of the league represented on the council may make public a statement of the facts of the dispute and of its conclusions regarding the same.

If a report by the council is unanimously agreed to by the members thereof other than the representatives of one or more of the parties to the dispute, the members of the league agree that they will not go to war with any party to the dispute which complies with the recommendations of the report.

If the council fails to reach a report which is unanimously agreed to by the members thereof other than the representatives of one or more of the parties to the dispute, the members of the league reserve to themselves the right to take such action as they shall consider necessary for the maintenance of right and justice.

If the dispute between the parties is claimed by one of them, and is found by the council to arise out of a matter which by international law is solely within the domestic jurisdiction of that party, the council shall not report, and shall make no recommendation as to its settlement.

The council may in any case under this article refer the dispute to the assembly. The dispute shall be so referred at the request of either party to the dispute, provided that such request be made within fourteen days after the submission of the dispute to the council.

In any case referred to the assembly all the provisions of this article and of Article Twelve relating to the action and powers of the council shall apply to the action and powers of the assembly, provided that the report made by the assembly, if concurred in by the representatives of those members of the league represented on the council and of a majority of the other members of the league, exclusive in such case of the representatives of the parties to the dispute, shall have the same force as a report by the council concurred in by all the members thereof other than the representatives of one or more of the parties to the dispute.

ARTICLE SIXTEEN
Should any member of the league resort to war in disregard of its covenants under articles twelve, thirteen or fifteen, it shall ipso facto be deemed to have committed an act of war against all other members of the league, which hereby undertake immediately to subject it to the severance of all trade or financial relations, the prohibition of all intercourse between the nationals of the covenant-breaking state and the nationals of any other state, whether a member of the league or not.

It shall be the duty of the council in such case to recommend to the several governments concerned what effective military or naval forces the members of the league shall severally contribute to the armaments of force to be used to protect the covenants of the league.

The members of the league agree further, that they will mutually support one another in the financial and economic measures which are taken under this article, in order to minimize the loss and inconvenience resulting from the above measures, and that they will mutually support one another in resisting any special measures aimed at one of their number by the covenant-breaking state, and that they will take the necessary steps to afford passage through their territory to the forces of any of the members of the league which are operating to protect the covenants of the league.

Any member of the league which has violated any covenant of the

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gue may be declared to be no longer a member of the league by a vote of the council concurred in by the representatives of all the members of the league represented therein.

ARTICLE SEVENTEEN
In the event of a dispute between a member of the league and a state which is not a member of the league, or between states not members of the league.
